COMMUNITY CONSULTATION - PUBLIC ACCESS

Community Consultation (Public Access) relating to items on this Agenda can be made between 9.00 am and 9.30 am on the day of the Meeting. Requests for public access should be made to the General Manager no later than COB on the Monday before the Meeting.

Section 8 of the Business Paper allows a period of up to 30 minutes of Open Council Meetings for members of the Public to address the Council Meeting on matters INCLUDED in the Business Paper for the Meeting.

Members of the public will be permitted a maximum of five (5) minutes to address the Council Meeting. An extension of time may be granted if deemed necessary.

Members of the public seeking to represent or speak on behalf of a third party must satisfy the Council Meeting that he or she has the authority to represent or speak on behalf of the third party.

Members of the public wishing to address Council Meetings are requested to contact Council either by telephone or in person prior to close of business on the Monday prior to the day of the Meeting. Persons not registered to speak will not be able to address Council at the Meeting.

Council will only permit two (2) speakers in support and two (2) speakers in opposition to a recommendation contained in the Business Paper. If there are more than two (2) speakers, Council's Governance division will contact all registered speakers to determine who will address Council. In relation to a Development Application, the applicant will be reserved a position to speak.

Members of the public will not be permitted to raise matters or provide information which involves:

- Personnel matters concerning particular individuals (other than Councillors);
- Personal hardship of any resident or ratepayer;
- Information that would, if disclosed confer a commercial advantage on a person with whom Council is conducting (or proposes to conduct) business;
- Commercial information of a confidential nature that would, if disclosed:
 - Prejudice the commercial position of the person who supplied it, or
 - Confer a commercial advantage on a competitor of the Council; or
 - Reveal a trade secret;
- Information that would, if disclosed prejudice the maintenance of law;
- Matters affecting the security of the Council, Councillors, Council staff or Council property;
- Advice concerning litigation or advice that would otherwise be privileged from production in legal proceedings on the ground of legal professional privilege;
- Information concerning the nature and location of a place or an item of Aboriginal significance on community land;
- Alleged contraventions of any Code of Conduct requirements applicable under Section 440; or
- On balance, be contrary to the public interest.

Members of the public will not be permitted to use Community Consultation to abuse, vilify, insult, threaten, intimidate or harass Councillors, Council staff or other members of the public. Conduct of this nature will be deemed to be an act of disorder and the person engaging in such behaviour will be ruled out of order and may be expelled.

CONFLICT OF INTERESTS

What is a "Conflict of Interests" - A conflict of interests can be of two types:

Pecuniary - an interest that a person has in a matter because of a reasonable likelihood or expectation of appreciable financial gain or loss to the person or another person with whom the person is associated.

Non-pecuniary – a private or personal interest that a Council official has that does not amount to a pecuniary interest as defined in the Local Government Act (eg. A friendship, membership of an association, society or trade union or involvement or interest in an activity and may include an interest of a financial nature).

Remoteness

A person does not have a pecuniary interest in a matter if the interest is so remote or insignificant that it could not reasonably be regarded as likely to influence any decision the person might make in relation to a matter or if the interest is of a kind specified in Section 448 of the Local Government Act.

Who has a Pecuniary Interest? - A person has a pecuniary interest in a matter if the pecuniary interest is the interest of:

- The person, or
- Another person with whom the person is associated (see below).

Relatives, Partners

A person is taken to have a pecuniary interest in a matter if:

- The person's spouse or de facto partner or a relative of the person has a pecuniary interest in the matter, or
- The person, or a nominee, partners or employer of the person, is a member of a company or other body that has a pecuniary interest in the matter.
- N.B. "Relative", in relation to a person means any of the following:
- (a) the parent, grandparent, brother, sister, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, lineal descends or adopted child of the person or of the person's spouse;
- (b) the spouse or de facto partners of the person or of a person referred to in paragraph (a)

No Interest in the Matter

However, a person is not taken to have a pecuniary interest in a matter:

- If the person is unaware of the relevant pecuniary interest of the spouse, de facto partner, relative or company or other body, or
- Just because the person is a member of, or is employed by, the Council.
- Just because the person is a member of, or a delegate of the Council to, a company or other body that has a
 pecuniary interest in the matter provided that the person has no beneficial interest in any shares of the company
 or body.

Disclosure and participation in meetings

- A Councillor or a member of a Council Committee who has a pecuniary interest in any matter with which the Council is concerned and who is present at a meeting of the Council or Committee at which the matter is being considered must disclose the nature of the interest to the meeting as soon as practicable.
- The Councillor or member must not be present at, or in sight of, the meeting of the Council or Committee:
 - (a) at any time during which the matter is being considered or discussed by the Council or Committee, or
 - (b) at any time during which the Council or Committee is voting on any question in relation to the matter.

No Knowledge - A person does not breach this Clause if the person did not know and could not reasonably be expected to have known that the matter under consideration at the meeting was a matter in which he or she had a pecuniary interest.

Participation in Meetings Despite Pecuniary Interest (S 452 Act)

A Councillor is not prevented from taking part in the consideration or discussion of, or from voting on, any of the matters/questions detailed in Section 452 of the Local Government Act.

Non-pecuniary Interests - Must be disclosed in meetings.

There are a broad range of options available for managing conflicts & the option chosen will depend on an assessment of the circumstances of the matter, the nature of the interest and the significance of the issue being dealt with. Non-pecuniary conflicts of interests must be dealt with in at least one of the following ways:

- It may be appropriate that no action be taken where the potential for conflict is minimal. However, Councillors should consider providing an explanation of why they consider a conflict does not exist.
- Limit involvement if practical (eg. Participate in discussion but not in decision making or vice-versa). Care needs to be taken when exercising this option.
- Remove the source of the conflict (eg. Relinquishing or divesting the personal interest that creates the conflict)
- Have no involvement by absenting yourself from and not taking part in any debate or voting on the issue as if the provisions in S451 of the Local Government Act apply (particularly if you have a significant non-pecuniary interest)

Disclosures to be Recorded (s 453 Act)

A disclosure (and the reason/s for the disclosure) made at a meeting of the Council or Council Committee or Sub-Committee must be recorded in the minutes of the meeting.

(ITEM GOV61/25) BUSINESS RATING REGIME FOR ALL AIR BNB PROPERTIES IN THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT AREA

SUMMARY

This report is in response to the April Resolution 40/25 for the Director of Corporate Services to investigate the possibility of Council implementing a Business Rating regime for all Air BnB properties in the local government area in those instances where owners are not using their properties for full-time residential purposes and properties are being made available for short-term rental within the marketplace.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND

Council, at its Ordinary Meeting held on 28 August 2024, adopted the following resolution (Resolution Number 1/24) regarding the establishment of an incorporated, not for profit association for purposes of managing the day-to-day operations of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts:

Resolved

That Council:

- (1) Notes the information contained in the report of the General Manager.
- (2) Supports and facilitates the establishment and functioning of an incorporated not for profit association under the Associations and Incorporations Act 2009 (NSW) for purposes of managing the day-to-day operations of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts.
- (3) Authorises the General Manager to make the necessary arrangements for the establishment of the Association mentioned in paragraph two above, through the engagement of Ms Kerri Swain of the local legal firm Jennings and Kneipp. Further, that the costs of this engagement, as well as other incidental costs like advertising costs for expressions of interests for membership of this newly formed Association, and other similar minor expenses, be borne by Council.
- (4) Approves a collaborative approach with all stakeholders to arrive at a Constitution for the new Association that will guarantee the ongoing operations of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts in the best interest of the Tenterfield local community, but also the Australian nation because of its historical significance.
- (5) Approves a first year contribution to the Association of \$40,000, which will be used as a starting point for discussions regarding its establishment.
- (6) Reserves the right to approve the final list of functions, services, and actions that will be enshrined within the Constitution of the newly formed Association.
- (7) Reserves the right to approve the final recurrent annual funding and the purposes thereof that will be made available by Council to the newly formed Association.
- (8) Reserves the right to approve the terms and conditions of the Agreement that will have to be entered into between Council and the newly established Association for it to be able to exercise the day-to-day operational management responsibilities of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts.
- (9) Continues to be responsible for the ongoing operational expenditure for museum advisory services, Arts North West membership, School of Arts building operations, cleaning, fire monitoring and inspections, security monitoring, insurance, and depreciation.

Councillor Distillation of Broad Issues from Discussions Between SOATI, TCTIB and Council on Wednesday, 14 May 2025

- Funding from Council should not be seen as grant funding. Anything purchased with Council
 funding should remain the property of Council (as it is ratepayers' monies). Profits generated
 must be reinvested into the premises, operational costs e.g. payment for films, performances
 and promotions and contractor costs if applicable. The intention is that SOATI would
 endeavour to be eventually self-funding.
- No equipment or ancillary items can be disposed of without written Council approval.
- Using Council funding for the employment of any SOATI members should be clear and transparent and subject to conflict-of-interest requirements.
- SOATI to provide three-monthly (and not six-monthly) reports on finances and operations to Council.
- Funding to SOATI should be on a four-monthly basis in advance but after progress reports
 have been received (after the first initial payment). (This allows payments and reports to be
 timely without the six-monthly payment hinging at the final moment on a quarterly report.)

 A walk through will need to be done at the beginning of the agreement period with representatives from Council, National Trust, Friends of the School of Arts and SOATI to do an equipment and condition stocktake.

- Priority building and equipment defects need to be attended to before handing over to SOATI –
 as far as Council's budget allows.
- The foyer should be shared by SOATI and TCTIB, and tourism should not be relegated to one small corner. Two electronic monitors (one landscape and one portrait), moveable brochures racks and a floor standing digital kiosk need to be catered for.
- The majority of Councillors want Council to enter into a separate agreement with the TCTIB for non-exclusive use of the foyer for Tourism Promotion and Visitor Information Services and a separate agreement with SOATI for the operation of the Cinema, Theatre and Museum while retaining a residual Council interest and rights.
- Depending on the outcome of these arrangements, the use of the office for a paid contractor would be included for the relevant party (or parties) if sharing the cost.
- A funding amount of \$40,000 for the first year for the operation of the Cinema, Theatre and Museum should be considered as per the Council Resolution of August 2024, with further negotiation including subsequent years' funding subject to evaluation of SOATI's budget, business plan and performance considerations.
- The majority of Councillors want the agreement changed from a Funding, Licence and Transfer of Management Agreement to a Facility User Agreement and separate Funding Agreement with key performance indicators between Council and SOATI.
- Whatever agreement is used and the method of funding, SOATI should still be able to remain as a not-for-profit association, with the ability to register as a charitable organisation and apply for Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status.
- Continued communication with the CEO of the National Trust should be maintained regarding the progression of the above-mentioned agreements.
- More clarity in any document is required e.g.:
 - Cleaning should be a 'do and charge' arrangement i.e. when there is an event it should be cleaned by SOATI to a reasonable standard and not be the responsibility of the Council cleaner to do extra work not agreed to in the cleaning contract.
 - o Keys and individual codes arrangements need to be specified in more detail.
 - Electricity Council should not be responsible for the full electricity cost if SOATI are having events with air conditioning and heating creating a high usage cost. That needs to be factored into the event cost.
 - Tighten any equipment use clause for external use e.g. must be suitably qualified people doing lights etc for a production including "Working at Heights" qualifications if relevant.
 - Tighten that a representative must be present for a set up for a production to ensure that proper processes are being adhered to and the building is opened and locked up afterwards.

- Draft budget submitted by SOATI there are concerns that the draft budget provided earmarked nearly all the money for contracted staff but included nothing for films or productions etc.
- Merchandise sales income would go to the relevant organisation depending on the item. This can be done easily through a "Square" type device including cash sales.

REPORT:

A series of communiques (primarily emails) have been included with this report to "tell the story" of how this matter has unfolded and where the parties are currently up to – for the perusal and consideration of Councillors.

Letter dated 27 May 2025

The following letter dated 27 May 2025 was received by Council from the President of SOATI via email on 29 May 2025:

"Since the Workshop on 14 May 2025, our Committee has been working on identifying the key issues for SOATI in regard to the Council proposal for SOATI to manage the School of the Arts, as currently understood. The Committee met on 21 May 2025 to discuss and resolve as to how to proceed. That meeting was held prior to your email received late on 21 May 2025, as to the proposed resolution being put to Council at its meeting on 28 May 2025 regarding shared use of the foyer with the Tenterfield Chamber of Tourism, Industry and Business (the Chamber). We have now also received from the General Manager on 24 May 2025 copies of Council business papers (items NM2/25 and GOV35/25). However, this letter, approved by the Committee, also broadly addresses the relevant contents of the business papers.

The written comments received from Council regarding drafting issues with Draft 3 of the Agreement prepared by SOATI, and provided by Council prior to the Workshop were being worked through towards the preparation of a Draft 4 in due course. The Committee had formed the view that most of the comments made by Councillors on Draft 3 could be accommodated or a compromise readily reached, other than possibly in respect of certain key issues as outlined below.

However, it is noted that in the report prepared by the General Manager for Item GOV35/25 it is proposed that the Council obtain legal advice regarding the most appropriate instrument/mechanism (licence/lease/user agreement) for Council. Further, the attachment to the report titled "Councillor Distillation of Broad Issues" also refers to a desire of a majority of Councillors to change the proposed agreement with SOATI to a "Facility User Agreement and separate Funding Agreement".

The proposal for separate user and funding agreements (without apparently a management component, or any entitlement to sole use) appears to substantially change the nature of the relationship between Council and the Association and would depart from the objects for which SOATI was established. Whether or not there are one, two or even three agreements does not change the fact that the agreements would need to be inter-dependent with each other e.g. SOATI could not take on any obligations to Council without funding being in place which it considers sufficient to become established and manage its operations.

Without being given a substantial level of autonomy over the management of the facility, the Committee is not confident it will qualify for grants, or for registration as a charity / obtain deductible gift recipient status, and so cannot work towards being self-funded.

SOATI was not established to be a club to organise and book use of the School of Arts with the Council. Its objects are clearly to manage the whole facility (excluding the library and the café areas). Any significant change in the proposed relationship with Council means that SOATI cannot fulfil its objects and will be obliged to go back to members to so report and decide on its future.

The Committee is also concerned as to the contents of the proposed resolution in item NM2/25 as to the sharing of use of the foyer with the Chamber. The ramifications for the management of the School of Arts as originally proposed at general meetings to establish SOATI, are still being considered. However, any substantial loss of use or control over the foyer by SOATI is not supported by the Committee, as it is a key part of the premises required for proper functioning by SOATI and fulfilment of its objects.

It is also unclear from the proposed resolution, as to whether the proposal put to the Workshop by the Chamber, that all volunteers (both undertaking visitor work and other volunteer duties) would be managed by SOATI. The proposed resolution appears to separate out the two functions completely, so that each would be responsible for their own volunteers and use of the space? This is a substantial change to the arrangement which was being negotiated with the Chamber, and confirmation as to whether or not this is intended is requested.

It is disappointing to the Committee that the same level of urgency as is apparently implicit in these Council papers, has not apparently been given to the establishment of the arrangements with SOATI to enable it to commence full operations.

In view of the papers currently before Council, no further work will be undertaken on the development of Draft 4 of the Agreement.

Should the Council consider that it is amenable to proceeding with consideration of a Draft 4 of the Agreement please advise in writing accordingly. However to resume work on Draft 4, the Committee will need the following information and assurances:

1. There needs to be a commitment from Council for funding for 3 financial years starting from 1/7/2025. On the basis of the Council meeting and Workshop and now the latest business papers, it is not clear that any such commitment is being offered.

SOATI proposes that the minimum level of funding that is required in order that SOATI may be able to be fully established, and hopefully thereafter be in a position to self-fund through grants, membership fees, donations and earnings from events and use of the facility would be:

\$40,000 set up funding payable on signing \$80,000 for the year 2025/6 \$80,000 + CPI increase for the year 2026/7 \$80,000 + CPI increase for the year 2027/8

On its costings to date, such funding would enable SOATI, to employ/contract 2 persons for up to seven days a week (with minimal overlap of their working hours) to undertake the necessary coordination and supervision of the facility, its events and volunteers and report to the Committee. The cost per annum for 2025/6 of this item of expenditure at \$35 per hour for 21 hours a week each (42 hours in total) alone would be \$77,000. The Committee does not consider it feasible for the coordination role to be undertaken by a volunteer, based upon information researched as to the manner in which the facility was previously successfully operated through use of several paid staff prior to the COVID closure.

Of course there are many other expenses than simply wages, to be paid in the running of the facility, and these would need to be properly costed prior to finalisation of the budget. The other funds needed

to run the facility, support the volunteers and develop initiatives to reinvigorate the facility, would need to be raised by SOATI from earnings from use of the facility, grants, membership fees and donations. If Council does not agree to this proposed funding level, please provide details of what Council considers it can commit to for the 3 year period referred to above, for further consideration by the Committee.

2. SOATI considers that the original end date of the Agreement must be extended due to the delays in the negotiation of the Agreement, and the clear likelihood of further delays in negotiating a sublease as envisaged under the Agreement.

SOATI proposes that the end date of the Agreement be 30 June 2028. Should the sublease and replacement funding arrangements be negotiated earlier, the Agreement can be terminated.

- 3. Please provide confirmation that:
- a. The National Trust has consented to the changes to be made to the foyer by the Chamber for the purpose of a visitor information centre, and as to the details of those changes and conditions of the consent. The email of 22 May 2025 from the National Trust, does not currently indicate that any changes to the foyer are consented to; only that it appears to indicate it would consider a permitted use of the foyer being for a tourism/information desk;
- b. The Chamber will be permitted to only install moveable structures, other than screens and pictures on the walls in half of the foyer, (as determined in consultation with SOATI) so that SOATI is able to move them when events are held.
- c. The foyer will be fully useable as a key area for the operations of SOATI as manager of the School of Arts, including for the holding of functions and events, and the office is for the sole use of SOATI.
- 4. Council recognises and will respect the independence of both SOATI and the Chamber, and that any agreement as to coordination of the use of the proposed shared space in the foyer must be between those two organisations and not dictated by the Council.
- 5. Council fully supports the management of the School of Arts by SOATI for at least 3 years, and is not proposing any alternative arrangement for the operations of the School of Arts for that period.

It is noted also that SOATI has not received answers to all of the questions raised by it with Council prior to the Workshop, and would appreciate receiving the answers to those remaining questions. The response by Council as a whole, in writing on the issues raised above is requested so that there is no ongoing confusion.

As these key issues are likely to be determinative as to whether the Committee continues to support an agreement (or agreements) with Council, a prompt response would be appreciated."

Pertaining to the first-mentioned resolution above, the list of Councillor Distilled Broad Issues are attached to this email, which should please be read as being an integral part of this Council Resolution.

I note that there are some discrepancies between the contents of your email and the list of Councillor Distilled Broad Issues, as well as with the content of the second Council

Resolution quoted above. On the other hand, some of your questions may have been answered as part of this Distilled Issues - document.

Therefore, it would be very much appreciated if you could convey these two above-quoted resolutions (with the list of Councillor Distilled Broad Issues) to your SOATI office bearers and provide me with your Committee's in-principle response/s as soon as is practically possible.

To be more to the point, with some opposing viewpoints in SOATI's letter of response to Council and the Council Resolutions adopted yesterday, it would be in everybody's best interest to know whether SOATI is principally still willing to keep the negotiations with Council going with the view of reaching a mutually-agreed-upon outcome.

Personally, I think and hope that the parties may not be that far apart.

I made the following comment in my report to the Council, which I would also like the SOATI-Committee to consider:

"The opinion is held that the reaching of an acceptable-to-both-parties-agreement is a project worth of **compromises** and **sacrifices** from all parties involved – for the greater good of the community" (emphasis added).

Further, it is noteworthy to mention that Council has also yesterday considered the outcome of a statistically valid Community Satisfaction Survey recently conducted by an independent, external contractor - where the top two issues in our local government area identified by the community are (1) roads maintenance and improvement, and (2) tourism.

This mentioned outcome is consistent with Council's own community consultation conducted a bit earlier as part of the development of a new suite of Strategic Planning documents. This outcome hopefully further puts the importance of tourism for Council in better perspective for the SOATI-Committee.

I understand and acknowledge that the journey thus far has not been without its challenges, but would like to urge you and your Committee to please consider these identified number of matters positively.

To facilitate a response by the "Council as a whole" on the issues and questions raised in your letter of response - as requested - will take some time, however, this approach is fully supported. This will mean obtaining a Council resolution after the matters raised have been workshopped by the Councillors.

In the shorter term, it is foreseen that Council's available resources will largely be occupied for the development of the Facility User Agreement between Council and TCTIB, pursuant to the second Council Resolution quoted above.

In the above regard, liaison with the CEO of the National Trust (NSW) will be ongoing, as has been the case regarding other matters pertaining to the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts.

If you want to further discuss this matter with me verbally, please do not hesitate to contact me on ."

Email dated 26 June 2025

The following email dated 26 June 2025 has been received from the SOATI-Secretary – with the General Manager's comments in italics throughout the text:

"Further to my email of 11 June 2025, our Committee has noted the outcome of the Council meeting on 23 June 2025 as to the approval of a non-exclusive Facility Permitted Use Licence (Licence Agreement) with the Tenterfield Chamber of Tourism, Industry and Business (the Chamber).

In reviewing the draft Licence Agreement, at the Committee's meeting yesterday, it was noted that on page 26 of the Licence Agreement the second paragraph refers to the consent of the National Trust to the Council granting to the Chamber a licence. However it also includes the words "in particular, the management and operation of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts Museum and Theatre spaces". These words in their context, appear to imply that the National Trust is consenting to management by the Chamber of the Museum and Theatre spaces, which does not equate with the rights being granted under the Licence Agreement itself (as to a non-exclusive licence to use the foyer only). Please advise if this is an error which is to be corrected; or alternatively if it is intended, what is the intention behind such a consent by the National Trust?

Kindly note that we (Council and Barton Perry) initially had other wording drafted, however, the National Trust came back with this exact wording which they wanted to be included in order to sign off on the Licence. It is basically the same wording that is in the head lease agreement between the National Trust and Council, so is all-encompassing. If and when Council enters into a Licence agreement with SOATI, I suggest that the same clause will also be included in such a document. So, in short, don't read anything specific into it.

Further, the Committee queries as to the reference in rule 4 of Annexure A to the Licence Agreement to a "delegate committee", which may in future oversee the management of the School of Arts. There is no definition of this quoted term in the Licence Agreement, and it is unclear what is intended. If it is intended as a reference to the School of Arts Tenterfield Inc, this is not an accurate description of the Association which is an independent incorporated entity, governed by its objects and the legislation under which it is incorporated i.e. it is not a "delegate committee". If this entity is some other proposal by Council for management of the School of Arts, please advise as to the details of this proposal accordingly.

I suggest that it could well be SOATI, or if negotiations between Council and SOATI fail, potentially another body. There is currently no resolution on the books regarding another proposal from Council.

At the Committee's meeting yesterday, it was also determined that, despite the lack of response to the Committee's previous letter of 29 May 2025, in the interests of clarity in any future negotiations with Council, it will proceed to prepare a specific response to the one page list of distilled issues attached to the paper for Item GOV35/25 at the 28 May 2025 Council meeting. I will be in touch again when that response is finalised.

It sounds good, thanks Gail.

Our Community No. 24 Cont...

The following responses (in italics) on the list of distilled issues mentioned in the Background" section of this report have been received from the SOATI-Secretary after the SOATI-Committee had considered these matters on 15 July 2025:

Funding from Council should not be seen as grant funding. Anything purchased with Council
funding should remain the property of Council (as it is ratepayers' monies). Profits generated
must be reinvested into the premises, operational costs e.g. payment for films, performances
and promotions and contractor costs if applicable. The intention is that SOATI would endeavour
to be eventually self-funding.

Any conditions on funding would need to be negotiated and included in the Agreement. SOATI will be raising funds from several sources – not just Council. Too many conditions on use of funding will only reduce the capacity of SOATI to achieve adequate cashflow to maintain its operations. As demonstrated in the draft budget already provided, most of the funding provided by Council would be likely to be spent on operational costs e.g. staff, maintaining equipment, insurance, training of volunteers for operations and workplace safety. It is unlikely that any funding from Council would be spent on assets (at least initially). The Committee will make applications for grants from other entities for specific funding for purchase of equipment or undertake fundraising for such purchases.

On a winding up of SOATI the distribution of any surplus assets would be as specified in the legislation governing it, which requires that "surplus property that is property supplied by a government department or public authority, including any unexpended portion of a grant, if any, must be returned (a) to the department or authority that supplied it, or (b) to a body nominated by the department or authority" (s 65(3) of the Associations Incorporation Act 2009 – AIA).

Section 65(1) AIA also gives effect to provisions in SOATI's constitution, which is currently the model constitution. Under rule 45, and subject to the Act and Regulation, on winding up the surplus property of the association must be transferred to another organisation with similar objects, and which is not carried on for the profit or gain of the organisation's members. Further if SOATI obtains charitable status, there would be further limitations on the transfer of any assets on winding up.

The draft Agreement provided by SOATI already provided in clause 22.2 that any unspent funds are recoverable by the Council on termination of the Agreement (similarly to the legislative provision referred to above). It also provided in clause 22.1 that any Licensed equipment (not disposed of with consent of Council) and any replacement equipment acquired by SOATI must be returned to the Council.

If a tightening up of these provisions is required by Council, please provide the wording changes being suggested for further consideration by SOATI.

In regard to the last sentence of Council's comment, the Agreement provided to Council was drafted on the basis that SOATI would be aiming to be self-funding in due course. However this would be unlikely to be achieved in the first 3 years of operation.

2. No equipment or ancillary items can be disposed of without written Council approval.

It is the understanding of the Committee, that a substantial amount of the equipment in the School of Arts is not owned by Council but by the National Trust (including through purchases by the Friends of the School of Arts), or third parties.

Accordingly, it will be the owner of the property from whom SOATI would seek approval for any disposal. This is recognised in clause 10 of the draft Agreement. That clause also provides that any negotiations with the National Trust by SOATI regarding use of the Premises and any property of the National Trust would be undertaken only in consultation with the Council.

There can be a provision included to more specifically confirm that any equipment will not be disposed of without the owner's consent, but if that consent is not obtained it will be removed and returned to the owner.

However, SOATI cannot commit to retaining on site redundant equipment indefinitely.

3. Using Council funding for the employment of any SOATI members should be clear and transparent and subject to conflict-of-interest requirements.

SOATI is answerable under the legislation under which it is incorporated, and also to its members. The AIA contains obligations, duties and procedures as to conflict of interest (Division 1A), the breach of which by members of the Committee are criminal offences.

It is not for Council to police the internal operations of SOATI on top of the legal obligations which already exist. SOATI is not a servant or agent of Council and cannot be so if it is to be eligible for grants, or to become a charity, and ultimately be self-funded.

Should Council seek to include some specific provision to this effect in the Agreement, further information would be required to ascertain exactly what standards are being imposed that are not already imposed on the Committee and its members, and the Committee would need to consider further if such constraints were necessary or acceptable.

4. SOATI to provide three-monthly (and not six-monthly) reports on finances and operations to Council.

The Committee considers it needs to be left to manage the facility and use its time and resources to ensure it is in a position to operate successfully for the longer term. Three monthly reporting would require more resources e.g. staff and advisers' time taking limited resources away from activities needed to reinvigorate the School of the Arts.

The draft Agreement proposed by SOATI provided for six monthly reports and also provided in clause 5.4(c) that Council may request additional information from SOATI in respect of use of any funds, and such information must be provided within 10 days. The Committee considered that this provision appropriately gave Council the right to request ad hoc reports where necessary between the 6 monthly reports.

However, the Committee would be agreeable to 3 monthly reports, provided that the information required on such a regular basis was not excessive. The content of such reports would need to be negotiated on this basis for inclusion in any agreement.

5. Funding to SOATI should be on a four-monthly basis -in advance but after progress reports have been received (after the first initial payment). (This allows payments and reports to be timely without the six-monthly payment hinging at the final moment on a quarterly report.)

The Committee notes that funding for the Chamber is provided 12 months in advance, with a 3 year commitment by Council. A similar time frame would more appropriately allow SOATI the ability to plan and manage its affairs.

However, SOATI would agree to 6 monthly in advance, as provided in the draft Agreement Schedule 1. The reasoning provided for four monthly funding as stated above, is unclear, and would in SOATI's view not allow the Association to appropriately plan for and manage the facility.

6. A walk through will need to be done at the beginning of the agreement period with representatives from Council, National Trust, Friends of the School of Arts and SOATI to do an equipment and condition stocktake.

This was already provided for in clause 9 of the Draft Agreement.

7. Priority building and equipment defects need to be attended to before handing over to SOATI as far as Council's budget allows.

Agreed that such defects would need to be fixed by Council. SOATI will need to know of all defects, whether attended to by Council as a "priority" or not.

8. The foyer should be shared by SOATI and TCTIB, and tourism should not be relegated to one small corner. Two electronic monitors (one landscape and one portrait), moveable brochures racks and a floor standing digital kiosk need to be catered for.

This has already been addressed by the Council's determination to grant a licence over the foyer to the Chamber. SOATI remains concerned that the foyer must still be able to be properly used for its primary function i.e. as a foyer to the theatre and museum spaces. It is not yet clear as to the full impact that the shared use of the foyer will have on the future operations of the museum and theatre. It remains unclear to the Committee as to the extent and timing of use of the foyer by the Chamber and which organisation will be responsible for moving display cases/ brochure stands when required.

9. The majority of Councillors want Council to enter into a separate agreement with the TCTIB for non-exclusive use of the foyer for Tourism Promotion and Visitor Information Services and a separate agreement with SOATI for the operation of the Cinema, Theatre and Museum while retaining a residual Council interest and rights.

As above. Our letter of 27/5/25 raised the issues the Committee sees that are unresolved as to how the coordination with the Chamber is to work. No further discussions have to date been held with the Chamber or the General Manager of the Council to clarify this issue. SOATI continues to consider that the primary function of the foyer must remain as a facility to support the theatre and museum.

It is noted that the office area has been licensed to the Chamber. This is not acceptable, as this is the sole area that SOATI would have to be able to conduct the office support required and to accommodate an employed coordinator. Accordingly a change to the proposed sharing of this office space is requested.

10. Depending on the outcome of these arrangements. the use of the office for a paid contractor would be included for the relevant party (or parties) if sharing the cost.

It is noted that the Chamber is not paying anything other than \$1 a year if demanded, for use of the office. SOATI proposes it should be for the sole use of SOATI, and should be at no cost to SOATI, other than a \$1 licence fee for access to the School of Arts facility overall.

11. A funding amount of \$40,000 for the first year for the operation of the Cinema, Theatre and Museum should be considered as per the Council Resolution of August 2024, with further

including subsequent years' funding subject to evaluation of SOATI's budget, business plan and performance considerations.

Our letter of 27 May 2025, already stated that the Committee is looking for a three year commitment from Council. The term of the Agreement as originally proposed was just over a year, but is now requested to be longer, in view of the delays and difficulty in negotiating this first Agreement with Council.

Without such a commitment, the Committee and SOATI could not take on the responsibilities and liabilities under the Agreement and which arises from the management of the School of Arts. It cannot take on debts that it reasonably is unable to fund. SOATI will have to devote much volunteer time and resources to reinvigorate the facility and anything less than a commitment by Council to funding for 3 years would mean that it is not feasible to even commence the task.

The conditions of the funding can include provision for SOATI to provide to Council SOATI's budget and business plan from time to time, for the information (not approval) of Council.

The Agreement already provides for repayment of Funds to Council, if they are spent other than in accordance with the Agreement (clause 4). There is also a right to terminate on 3 months notice (clause 21). Should Council not consider that SOATI is appropriately managing the facility or the funds being provided at any time during the term of the agreement it has an easy manner in which to address this by not providing future funding, threatening termination or actually terminating. There is also provision for dispute resolution in clause 23.

12. The majority of Councillors want the agreement changed from a Funding, Licence and Transfer of Management Agreement to a Facility User Agreement and separate Funding Agreement with key performance indicators between Council and SOATI.

See letter of 27 May 2025. A user agreement alone is not acceptable.

13. Whatever agreement is used and the method of funding, SOATI should still be able to remain as a not-for-profit association. with the ability to register as a charitable organisation and apply for Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status.

Agreed. However, a user agreement as proposed above would not assist with SOATI obtaining charitable and DGR status as it would no longer be responsible for management of the School of Arts, but instead would be a mere "user".

14. Continued communication with the CEO of the National Trust should be maintained regarding the progression of the above-mentioned agreements.

Yes noted and agreed. This is a responsibility of Council and not SOATI. It was always envisaged that any requirements of the National Trust for an agreement between Council and SOATI would have to be ascertained by Council and communicated to SOATI.

- 15. More clarity in any document is required e.g.:
 - a. Cleaning should be a 'do and charge' arrangement i.e. when there is an event it should be cleaned by SOATI to a reasonable standard and not be the responsibility of the Council cleaner to do extra work not agreed to in the cleaning contract.

Agreed. However now the extra cleaning associated with visitors to the information centre will need to be factored in also. SOATI can be responsible for its fair share.

b. Keys and individual codes arrangements need to be specified in more detail.

If Council provides the detail required, the Committee will amend / consider further.

c. Electricity- Council should not be responsible for the full electricity cost if SOATI are having events with air conditioning and heating creating a high usage cost. That needs to be factored into the event cost.

Clause 3.4(b)(iii) of the draft Agreement provided for electricity to be at the expense of Council, as this was what was stated in the document, "Proposed Separation of Responsibilities" as provided to SOATI representatives at the first meeting held with the General Manager on 10 February 2025. It is understood that this was a document that came out of the steering committee process.

It is agreed that longer term, when SOATI is less dependent on Council support, that the fair division of electricity costs between SOATI and other users of the complex would be appropriate. This may require separate metering.

Certainly in running events and hiring out the facility, such costs would ultimately have to be taken into account in setting fees by SOATI.

d. Tighten any equipment use clause for external use e.g. must be suitably qualified people doing lights etc for a production including "Working at Heights" qualifications if relevant.

This is unnecessary. SOATI will be obliged to comply with many workplace health and safety laws, including any requirement for use of qualified people for some tasks, and it is not necessary for Council to police this.

e. Tighten that a representative must be present for a set up for a production to ensure that proper processes are being adhered to and the building is opened and locked up afterwards.

As above.

f. Draft budget submitted by SOATI - there are concerns that the draft budget provided earmarked nearly all the money for contracted staff but included nothing for films or productions etc.

The draft budget provided to Council, did provide for line items of the costs of cinema and theatre operations in the "operating expenditure". However, the quantification of such items had not yet been included, particularly as the scheduling of regular cinema showings would not be likely to occur in the first year of operation. From research to date the cost of running first run movies would not be recoverable from likely takings, and it is noted that the Film Club already provides access to affordable cinema in the School of

Arts. SOATI would expect to continue to hire the theatre to the Film Club as long as it desired to continue to use it.

In the longer term it is considered that SOATI may schedule specific themed cinema events (possibly with sponsors), which would be more likely to be cost recoverable or achieve a small surplus to assist in the running costs of the School of Arts.

In general, the draft budget remains a work in progress and is subject to several uncertainties at this time including the timing and amount of funding from Council, the extent of responsibilities given to SOATI, the resources that SOATI will need to devote to assisting the information centre staffing and running and the commencement date and terms of any agreement with Council. The budget is likely to continually change even after any agreement is entered into with Council, as SOATI will be in start up mode for some time after commencing operations.

g. Merchandise sales income would go to the relevant organisation depending on the item. This can be done easily through a "Square" type device including cash sales.

It is not clear why this item has been included by Councillors. Any point of sale equipment and arrangements made by SOATI to support its operations would be a matter for SOATI. Should there be shared use of the foyer any arrangements for sales of either tickets or merchandise would be a matter for the individual entities using the foyer to either provide separately or if they should so determine, jointly. However any such arrangements would solely be between the entities concerned i.e. possibly the Chamber and SOATI, but not the Council.

Email dated 15 July 2025

The following email was forwarded by the General Manager to the Secretary of SOATI on 15 July.

"I hope you are well and keeping warm.

I just thought I'd follow up on the below excerpt from your last email:

At the Committee's meeting yesterday, it was also determined that, despite the lack of response to the Committee's previous letter of 29 May 2025, in the interests of clarity in any future negotiations with Council, it will proceed to prepare a specific response to the one page list of distilled issues attached to the paper for Item GOV35/25 at the 28 May 2025 Council meeting. I will be in touch again when that response is finalised.

We have been able to make progress with the finalisation of the Permitted Use Licence for TCTIB, although it has not been signed off on yet. However, we are aiming for around 21 July or shortly after for the document to hopefully be signed.

It would be helpful if I could get SOATI's responses on the list of distilled issues so that we can start working towards progressing further discussions with SOATI.

I apologise for putting pressure on you, but would also like to work towards bringing this matter to conclusion as soon as is practically possible - in the best interest of all concerned.

Email dated 1 August 2025

The copied email below was sent by the General Manager to the SOATI-Secretary on 1 August 2025, as preliminary responses to seven points made SOATI as "remaining queries" in an email dated 31 July 2025. As previously, the General Manager's responses are in italics:

"I have copied the list of issues you provided me with yesterday below and have made comments in red throughout your text in those instances where it is possible for me to do so at this stage - based on direction already provided by Council in previous resolutions.

I confirm with you my verbal statement that I intend to provide information to Councillors about the current status with SOATI at the Councillor Workshop scheduled for 13 August 2025, after which a report will be prepared for the consideration of Council at its 27 August 2025 Council Meeting.

- 1. A three (3) year term on the initial agreement. *Noted, although this is an issue that will need a resolution commitment from Council.*
- 2. Sufficient funding for that 3 year term. Noted, although this is again an issue that will need a resolution commitment from Council. Your further comment below is also noted, and it will indeed be helpful, if not imperative, if you could state in clear terms what Dollar amount would be expected from SOATI to meet your definition of "sufficient funding".

 The Committee is currently considering the effect of removing responsibility from our coordinator for volunteers for the visitor information facility. It is likely that fewer hours per week will be required. A revised budget will be prepared on this basis in due course.
- 3. Council must recognise and respect that SOATI is a separate legal entity to Council and is not its servant or agent. *Noted, and will be relayed as such to the Councillor Workshop and Council Meeting.*
- 4. The agreement with Council should provide for transfer of management, funding and at least a license (or sub-lease) to use the premises. *Noted, and my opinion is that this matter has been clarified. Therefore, it is my expectation that a Facility Permitted Use Agreement, similar to the one that had recently been entered into with TCTIB, will also be prepared for SOATI and Council.*
- 5. The foyer is to be available to SOATI for its primary function of being the entry for the museum and the theatre functions (as well as a gathering/socialising space for theatre patrons) and also to house its administrative functions, including the office for our coordinator. Any equipment installed by the Chamber which may impede such use must be moved by the Chamber on request by SOATI to an agreed area, to allow full use of the foyer for events and the primary functions of the School of Arts. The foyer has been identified as a shared area that will have to be shared between TCTIB and SOATI, once a formal agreement is entered into between Council and SOATI. This will mean that these two organisations will have to work together on a basis of being flexible, and with good intentions and goodwill to each other. As an example, a merchandise cabinet for the secure displaying of tourism items offered for sale to the public may be too large to be shifted and might be better left in place to prevent damage to the timber floors and possible WH&S-concerns like back injuries to staff. Further, it needs to be acknowledged and accepted by SOATI that the delivery of a visitor experience service out of the School of Arts by TCTIB has now become part of the primary functions of this facility - with the blessing of the National Trust (NSW). Personally, I am wondering about the rigid manner in which point 5 is worded and am concerned that such an approach is not reminiscent of the flexibility that would be required from both parties to make a shared arrangement in the foyer a viable one. Please let me know if my perception and/or interpretation in this regard is inaccurate, as I sincerely hope to be the case.

6. The office in the foyer must be made available solely for the use of SOATI, as it will be the office in which SOATI equipment necessary for administration will be housed and will also be the office of the coordinator and volunteers who support the functions of the School of Arts. Similar to my comments above regarding point 5 (the foyer area), the office space has been identified as a shared space. Therefore, my other comments made above in relation to point 5 are also applicable in the same vein regarding point 6. Again, please let me know if my interpretation in this regard is off the mark.

7. There must be a clear written commitment and support from Council going forward to work cooperatively with SOATI to achieve the joint aim of sustainable future management and reinvigoration of the School of Arts. *Noted, and will be relayed as such to the Councillor Workshop and Council Meeting.*

It is trusted that you find the above comments helpful, and I am looking forward to you providing me with an expected Dollar figure regarding point 2, as well as your positive responses regarding my expressed concerns regarding points 5 and 6."

Email dated 14 August 2025

A follow-up email has been sent by the General Manager to the SOATI-Secretary on 14 August 2025:

"Please find attached my preliminary answers on the remaining "additional questions" posed by SOATI. We have unfortunately lately experienced a period of staff being away from work unwell; impacting on our ability to gather the necessary information and also attending to other important and priority tasks within the organisation.

I confirm that SOATI's responses on the distilled list of Councillor matters, the list of issues with my responses in the email below, as well as the attached "additional questions" with my responses have been discussed at a Councillor Workshop held yesterday (Wednesday, 13 August 2025).

I was hoping to take these matters in a report format to Council for consideration at the Council Meeting dated 27 August 2025, including SOATI's responses on my question and concerns raised regarding points 2, 5 and 6 respectively in the email dated 1 August 2025 below.

Clarification of these points are important for Council in order for them to be further pursued and considered.

Unfortunately the deadline for reports for the August 2025 Council Meeting has now closed, and I will not be able to put a report in this regard to Council this month.

It is also important for me to note that the Facility Permitted Use Licence between Council, the Tenterfield Chamber of Tourism Industry and Business, and the National Trust (NSW), for a visitor information service to be provided out of the foyer of the School of Arts has now been duly signed by all these mentioned parties.

I am looking forward to you providing me with SOATI's written responses on the three items mentioned above (as are detailed in the email below).

The preliminary answers to the "additional questions" referred to in the email above are provided below. Again, the responses provided by the General Manager are in italics:

	records. Debbie Mills, CEO of the National Trust (NSW) will have a search of their organisation's records, but Council hasn't had any feedback yet. I suggest that this document (if found to be in existence) will be made available to SOATI at the time of Council and the National Trust entering into a formal licencing arrangement with SOATI.
8.	Who owns the AB Butler collection and have they given permission for its removal to the Pearson building, and when is this currently scheduled to occur? Cr Greg Sauer is the current Chair of the Tenterfield National Monument's Association (TNMA.
	Mr Peter Reid (who is now deceased) was negotiating with the Butler family for this organisation to have access to the Butler collection for exhibition in the Resources Building – hence the Council resolution for this building to be made available for this purpose.
	This role has now been taken over by Mr. Zac Curry, and Cr Sauer will contact him to determine where the negotiations are up to.
	It is acknowledged by the TNMA that the exhibition space in the Resources building is limited, and they were thinking about rotating different exhibition pieces within this space.
	I believe Ms Jane I'ons is involved with the TNMA (as secretary) and is also involved with SOATI.
	TNMA doesn't have access to adequate financial resources and as such, they experience some operational challenges.
	Cr Sauer will provide Council with further feedback once he gets more information from Mr Curry.

9.	Is there no possibility of the Pearson building being licensed to SOATI also as part of this Agreement, on the understanding that there be ultimately accommodation for the TNMAI to house the AB Butler collection there, along with storage /other uses by SOATI for the purposes of the SofA? If there is to be a sublease from Council to the TNMAI, when is it to start?
	No, there is a standing Council resolution for this space to be made available to the TNMA, and Council is currently awaiting the approval of the Governor to proceed with this arrangement. This arrangement will be put in place as soon as the Governor's approval/sign-off is received.

12	What collections are in the Pearson building and are they expected to be housed in the SofA building? If so where?
	There are no current "collections" in the Pearson building, although there are numerous items stored in this building.
13	Where are all of the unused / not working property no longer required by SOATI to be stored? Will Council provide a space and transport arrangements for storage / disposal?
	There is still significant storage area available at the back of the stage and depending on what items will need to be stored, such space (with some re-arrangement of the existing items stored) will be able to be used. Once an inventory has been taken and items documented, including non-working and superfluous items identified, this situation will be able to be addressed. It is suggested to probably be a bit premature at this stage.

No	Question/issue
16	Please confirm that the insurer providing the public liability insurance has agreed to include SOATI as an additional insured party, and provide a copy of the policy.
	Council's advice is that it's insurer will not take responsibility for another organisation's Public Liability insurance. SOATI will have to obtain its own Public Liability insurance with regards to the licenced areas it will take responsibility for. This same situation is also applicable to TCTIB.
17	Is Arts North West membership to be kept up by Council for the next 2-3 years, and if so will this membership permit access to these resources by SOATI? Contact with Arts North West by SOATI has not been successful to date. (This is despite repeated attempts to contact Arts North West. It is noted that there was a resolution passed at the Council meeting on 28 August 2024 providing for continued membership. However SOATI itself has not been able to access the resources of Arts North West, and requests that Council advise as to how to arrange this). It is Council's intention to maintain its membership with Arts North-West into the future, as this organisation provides a benefit to the Tenterfield Shire's broader community. It is foreseen that, once SOATI has entered into a formal Licence agreement with Council, it will have access to Arts North West in its capacity as the provider of the Arts and Cultural Services out of the School of Arts on Council's behalf.
18	The projector and possibly other equipment is in need of service. Please confirm that the projector maintenance schedule is being adhered to. (There is a light on the projector indicating that maintenance is due). Also please advise as to the maintenance schedule and arrangements in place for any other key equipment in the building. All such key equipment should be handed over to SOATI in a maintained condition. (It is understood that the Council has recently determined to renew the Edge contract for the cinema, so that this issue may be resolved in part). The Edge contract has in fact recently been renewed by Liz. Council will do its best, conditional upon its budgetary constraints, to provide the equipment in a maintained condition, and in those instances where it is unaware of maintenance requirements, to follow up on those.

Email dated 27 August 2025

After the above email with attachment had been considered by the SOATI-Committee, the Secretary provided the following response to the General Manager on 27 August 2025:

"We refer to your email of 14 August 2025 below. Our response is essentially as provided to you in our email of 6 August 2025 (copy attached) i.e. that the Committee considers it has already provided sufficient information as to its desires in regard to the terms of the arrangement with the Council, and it is now for Council to provide in detail what it considers it can offer. In particular, the Committee is waiting on Council to provide a draft agreement or agreements which provide for the issues of a licence, transfer of management and funding. Until that is provided and considered acceptable, the Committee is unable to finalise any budget, apply for further grants, seek donations or plan events to assist with alternative income generation.

As the promoter of the proposal of the Association taking on the management of the School of Arts, it is in the interests of Council to adequately fund the Association in its initial 3 years to ensure that it has the capacity to undertake the task, until it is in the position to obtain funding more broadly.

As previously stated, the Committee is waiting for an indication from Council as to the funding it is in a position to provide. As you would appreciate, the extent of reinvigoration of the School of Arts is largely dependent on the funding that the Association can obtain from Council in the initial 3 years. A more limited funding commitment, will result in the Association having limited capacity to commit to the engagement of acts and events at the facility, foster the growth of use of the facility, and apply for funding to support the School of Arts; with its role instead being limited to the essentials such as the taking bookings and the training and management of the volunteers for the museum.

Pending receipt of the draft agreement/s and proposed funding from Council, the Committee is planning a budget workshop shortly to try to refine the previous draft budget provided to Council. The Committee will need to take account of the change in the proposed role of the Association in managing volunteers for the tourist information hub, the lack of full access to the office and foyer and storage areas and possible need to provide for alternative space and facilities, the responses received with your email of 14 August 2025, and our updated research on likely costs and potential income. This may result in changes to the draft budget figures and funding proposals previously provided. It is important to note that SOATI has not been invited to be part of any discussions regarding shared use of the foyer/office/storage space even though it will impact our operation of the facility. Despite the fact that we do not yet have a formal agreement with Council, we were established as a result of an August 2024 resolution by council for the purpose of, among other things, "managing the day-to-day operations of the Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts".

On a separate issue that has come to the attention of the Committee, the Committee was surprised as to the contents of a late amendment to the agreement with the Chamber as referred to in Council minutes from the last meeting. That amendment appears to envisage that that the Chamber will have volunteers undertaking the task of guiding people through the museum. There should be only one entity responsible for such a task and one source of training and engagement of volunteers for the museum, and that should be SOATI as the entity established for this purpose. Once an agreement is in place with the Council for access and management by SOATI, SOATI will require that all volunteers for the museum are solely organised and supported through SOATI. This is essential for workplace health and safety requirements, the security of the collections in the museum and insurance which will be needed to cover the work to be done by volunteers and also visitors to this part of the facility.

The Committee awaits receipt of a draft agreement or agreements for licence, management transfer and funding in order that the proposal for management of the School of Arts by the Association can be moved forward.

As per your previous request I have not included the Councillors in this response, although I note they are copied into the email you sent to me. However the Committee is happy for you to forward this response on to Councillors and other staff who need to be informed."

Email dated 8 September 2025

The following response was sent by the General Manager to the SOATI-Secretary on 8 September 2025:

"Thank you for your email - the contents of which has been noted.

I intend to take this information to our Councillor Workshop scheduled for Wednesday, 10 September 2025 and then potentially by way of a report to the September Council Meeting a fortnight later.

As mentioned in an earlier communication, a draft licence will only be able to be pursued after the parties have reached agreement on the major outstanding issues and a Council resolution to this effect has been adopted.

Email dated 17 September 2025

The following email was received from the Secretary of SOATI on 17 September 2025 at 11.25am, just before the business papers were processed.

"The Committee has reviewed its previous budget, and on its current understanding of the scope of the role of the Association, likely expenditure and revenue sources, considers that funding from Council of \$50,000 for the first year, increased in the second and third years by CPI, would be the minimum funding required. If further detail is required on its assumptions in the budget, this could be explained by the Committee to the Councillors at a future meeting.

Otherwise the Committee looks forward to receiving from Council the further detail as to the terms of the proposed agreement and funding it considers appropriate. The Committee remains keen to have the arrangements finalised with Council as soon as possible, so that the work of the Association can properly commence."

Conclusion

In conclusion, the opinion is held that it would be fair to state that the two major strategic questions that need answering are as follows:

- (1) Is Council willing to enter into a three-year Facility Permitted Use Licence agreement with SOATI?
- (2) What amount of funding is Council willing to make available to SOATI on an annual basis for this three-year period (assuming that the answer to the first question is in the affirmative)?

Of course there are a number of other matters that will also still have to be clarified and agreed upon in such a Facility Permitted Use Licence document, such as the shared foyer and office space with TCTIB, TCTIB's ability to also take visitors through the museum, and exactly what services SOATI would be able to provide for the annual amount made available to them by Council – to name a few.

COUNCIL IMPLICATIONS:

1. Community Engagement / Communication (per engagement strategy)

Ample community consultation was done as part of the establishment of the SOATI group – including three public meetings.

2. Policy and Regulation

- Local Government Act 1993
- Local Government (General) Regulation 2021

• Associations and Incorporations Act 2009

3. Financial (Annual Budget & LTFP)

Council has made provision in its 2025/26 Operational Plan and Budget for an expense amount of around \$80,000 for "School of Arts Operations" – excluding "fixed operational costs" like insurances, fire monitoring and inspections, cleaning, museum advisory service, etc. – but including a provision for potential seed funding to SOATI and an additional amount for potential day-to-day operational expenses.

It is suggested that it would be astute of Council to also factor into the equation the fact that TCTIB has already indicated to Council their need for increased funding.

4. Asset Management (AMS)

The Sir Henry Parkes Memorial School of Arts is not Council's property. Council has entered into a long-term lease agreement of 50-years with the National Trust of Australia (NSW) on 1 July 1999 for a yearly rent of \$1.00.

However, this lease agreement makes provision for Council to accept full operational responsibility for this asset, as if it were Council's own asset. This is arguably not an entirely fair arrangement but represents the current situation.

Clause 4.3 of the lease agreement deals with payment by Council of "any municipal or water land taxes and other charges, outgoings or assessment which may at any time during the term, be separately levied or imposed on the land or any part thereof", and "the cost and expense of all services to the land and including but without limiting the generality of the foregoing telephone, electricity, electricity meter rents, oil, gas, excess water, garbage and trade waste removal."

Clause 9 deals with Council's responsibility in terms of a conservation management plan, as follows:

"The tenant will restore, refurbish and redevelop the building consistently with the uses permitted by this lease but only:

- 9.1.1 In accordance with a conservation management plan 'the Plan' prepared by a suitable qualified heritage consultant adopted by the joint committee and approved by the Heritage Council of New South Wales, and for the time being in force; and
- 9.1.2 With the prior consent of the Landlord which will not be unreasonably withheld in subclause 9.1.1 is complied with."

Clause 10 deals with Council's responsibility to keep improvements in repair, as follows:

"The tenant must at all times well and substantially repair and keep in good and substantial repair and condition all improvements erected now or at any time hereafter on the land and all additions to all improvements and every part thereof including the fire equipment appurtenances drains and pipes."

Clause 6.17 separately deals with Council's responsibility to "provide and maintain in good order and condition and keep readily available for use upon the land proper and sufficient fire fighting and fire extinguishing appliances to the satisfaction of the Tenant's Fire Control Officer".

Also, Clause 6.18 specifically addresses the Parkes Collection, stating that "The Parkes Collection will be housed in the School of Arts building and the landlord and the tenant will enter into a written agreement providing for the storage, maintenance and preservation of the Parkes Collection."

Clause 11 deals with the payment of insurances by Council and the Landlord, stating in Clause 11.1. that public liability insurances will be the responsibility of Council, whilst the Landlord "will during the term of this Lease insure the building and contents, including but not limited to the Parkes Collection, for its full insurable value" (subclause 11.3.1). However, subclause 11.3.2 makes provision for these building and contents insurance payments to be reimbursed by Council to the Landlord.

A "Building Condition Assessment Report" of the Tenterfield School of Arts had been done by Council's Building Surveyor in November 2023, listing 42 items of either an operational or capital nature that need attention. All these items have not been costed, but it will in all probability add up to somewhere between \$100,000 and \$200,000 – maybe more – given that it is an old and heritage listed building with some water leak damage.

Since SOATI, as an incorporated association is a legal entity in its own right, it will be in a position to apply for and administrate grant funding for purposes including the maintenance and renewal of the building structure and its components – of course with the necessary consultation with Council and obtaining the necessary approvals from the National Trust NSW.

5. Workforce (WMS)

Council does not have the resources, both financial and human, to operationally manage the School of Arts – like it used to do in the past. Therefore, the establishment of an incorporated not for profit association has been considered to fulfill this function.

6. Legal and Risk Management

Council has entered into a 50-year lease agreement with the National Trust of Australia (NSW) on 1 July 1999, with a termination date of 30 June 2049, and with an option to renew the lease for another 50 years (Clause 3.2 read in conjunction with Item 4 of the Reference Schedule) – but subject to the Governor's Consent.

However, Council may terminate this lease in accordance with the provisions of Clause 3.1.2 of the Lease Agreement. It reads as follows:

"3.1.2 Notwithstanding Clause 3.1.1 hereto the Tenant may at any time upon giving not less than six (6) months prior written notice to the Landlord surrender this lease which surrender will determine the term hereby

granted but such surrender will be without prejudice to the rights of either party in respect of any antecedent breach matter or thing."

Similarly, the landlord may terminate the lease with Council with six (6) months' notice if Council (the tenant) "ceases to be the council for the Local Government area in which the land is situated", or Council "loses the right or power to use or maintain the land or the building as provided for in this lease".

It will be imperative for a clear and legally binding Agreement between Council and SOATI to be prepared and executed - delineating the services and functions that will be provided and the parameters within which it will happen, including the term that the arrangement will be valid for, a quarterly reporting mechanism, and the recurrent annual financial contribution and assistance Council will be providing.

Please also refer to the comments made above under the sub-heading "Asset Management".

In addition, it is important to note that an incorporated association is a legal entity in its own right, separate from its members. Therefore, members are protected against any claims made against the association such as debts, or compensation claims for negligence.

7. Performance Measures

As was mentioned above, a quarterly reporting mechanism will have to be built into the legally binding Agreement between Council and SOATI.

8. Project Management

This project has unfortunately taken a significantly longer time to process than what was initially anticipated, however, a Facility Permitted Use Licence has successfully been entered into with TCTIB for the provision of a visitor welcoming service out of the foyer of the School of Arts – which took the focus and resources away from finalising the SOATI-matter.

SUMMARY

Ten FM wishes to remain at 142 Manners Street on a long-term basis, seeking a 5x5x5 lease to provide security for future planning, with consideration by Council to reduce the current weekly rental rate.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

- 1. Notes the contents of the report.
- 2. Considers the request from the President of TenFM for the annual rental amount of \$250 per week at 142 Manners Street, Tenterfield to be reduced, as well as for a $5 \times 5 \times 5$ lease agreement to be entered into.

BACKGROUND

At the 22 May 2024, Ordinary Council Meeting, Council resolved to renew the lease with Ten FM for 142 Manners Street, Tenterfield for a period of 13 months, with the lease to terminate on 30 June 2025.

The resolution also urged TenFM to consider options to purchase the property, pay commercial rent of the premises or move to another location, and for TenFM to communicate their future intention in clear writing to Council by no later than 31 January 2025.

For ease of reference, an extract of this resolution is provided below for Councillors' reference.

(ITEM ECO6/24) UPDATE ON NEGOTIATIONS WITH TEN FM MANAGEMENT - 142 MANNERS ST, TENTERFIELD.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to advise Council of negotiations with Ten FM management on renewing its Lease for the Council owned building at 142 Manners St, Tenterfield. Ten FM management have advised that they are unable to pay the full increase as per Ordinary Council Meeting- 27 March 2024 - Mayoral Minute – ITEM 1: SEEK EXPRESSIONS OF INTEREST TO LEASE 157 ROUSE STREET, TENTERFIELD AND TEN FM BE OFFERED A COMMERCIAL LEASE. Ten FM management have suggested they may be able to pay a more realistic rent.

75/24 Resolved that Council:

- Notes the update on negotiations on the Lease of 142 Manners Street, Tenterfield.
- (2) Accepts Ten FM Committee's offer to renew its Lease on 142 Manners St, Tenterfield for a rental fee of \$250.00 per week, plus the water, sewerage, electricity and garbage removal charges applicable to the

premises for a period of thirteen (13) months – starting on 1 June 2024 and terminating on 30 June 2025.

- (3) Delegates the authority to the General Manager to execute the necessary lease documents and enter into a Lease Agreement with Ten FM.
- (4) Urges the Ten FM management to investigate their options during the course of the lease term; whether they would like to purchase the house located at 142 Manners Street, pay a commercial rent for this premises, or move to another location.
- (5) Further, that the Ten FM management communicates in writing their clear future intention to Council by no later than 31 January 2025.

Mr. Ben White, President of Tenterfield & District Community FM Radio Association Incorporated, met with the General Manager and Mayor of Tenterfield Shire Council on 11 July 2025 to discuss the Association's current financial and operating status including their progression of plans.

REPORT:

The following letter dated 22 July 2025 has been received from Mr. White:

"Following our discussion with you and Mayor Bronwyn Petrie at Tenterfield Shire Council on 11 May, we write to confirm—as noted in our email to Bronwyn dated 25 November 2024—that Ten FM wishes to remain at 142 Manners Street on a long-term basis. We would welcome the opportunity to sign a 5x5x5 lease to provide security for future planning. As discussed, we would request that the lease include a break clause with

appropriate notice, to allow flexibility in response to evolving technology that may reduce the need for a fixed office in the future.

We are currently progressing with our plans to upgrade the studio and establish training capabilities at this location, in line with the grant we received. Laura Holt Consulting has been engaged as the project manager, and initial electrical work has commenced via Andrew Petrie. We are now awaiting delivery of equipment, although we are experiencing some delays due to international supply issues.

In addition, we have consulted with Matt Sing at Fire to Flourish regarding the \$15,000 grant we received from that program. He is supportive of how the funds are being allocated.

As part of our upgrade, we plan to paint the exterior of the building and at least the interior of the studio to make the space more inviting. We are also implementing improvements to flooring and sound insulation.

For training delivery, we plan to partner with the Community Media Training Organisation (CMTO), which offers a variety of online media training modules. Practical components will be conducted in the upgraded studio. https://cmto.trainingvc.com.au/

We acknowledge that Ten FM's presence in Tenterfield has been disrupted in recent years, while the Stanthorpe operation has grown. This has impacted our local reputation. While we recognise that Stanthorpe benefits from a larger volunteer base, we are committed to reinvigorating our presence in Tenterfield and attracting new volunteers to ensure the community has a stronger local voice.

We would greatly value the Council's support in this effort and are open to constructive ideas. If you are aware of any upcoming events that would benefit from a live outside broadcast—along with on-air promotion—we'd love to be involved. We also welcome suggestions of local individuals for interviews or input on how we can better engage with the community.

We would particularly welcome the opportunity to conduct regular interviews with Mayor Bronwyn Petrie to highlight the work of Tenterfield Shire Council. This would mirror the successful segments we have been running with Melissa Hamilton in Stanthorpe. Graeme Haycraft is available to conduct these interviews via telephone.

To support our operations, we also recognise the need to refresh our sponsorship model and actively seek sponsors across the entire broadcast region. In the meantime, we would appreciate Council's consideration of a review of our current rental rate of \$250 per week. While we understand Council is under financial pressure, this rate is currently placing considerable strain on our limited resources. A reduced rental during this rebuilding phase would help us work towards sustainability. As revenue improves, we would be open to revisiting the rental arrangement in alignment with Council's needs.

We are also actively pursuing grant opportunities and have launched community fundraising efforts—including raffles, sausage sizzles, street stalls, and entertainment events—which have been well received.

As you are aware, the management committee in Tenterfield has faced disruptions since our 2024 AGM. However, we now have a stable and cooperative committee that is working positively toward a stronger future. We have also appointed Graeme Haycraft

as our volunteer Station Manager, providing a single point of contact for Ten FM staff and the public. His extensive experience in community radio is already proving valuable.

In summary, we are making strong progress in restoring Ten FM as a cross-border community asset. We understand this has not been an easy journey for Council, and we are truly grateful for your patience and support."

A further email has been received from Mr. White on 3 September 2025, which reads as follows:

"I've attached a budget spreadsheet and also a sensitivity analysis based on the continuing downward trend in our sponsorship revenue. We have offset this to some extent over the last few months through various fundraising activities but I don't believe this is sustainable long term, as the pressure on our volunteers is high, and I am also concerned that we may be taking money away from other deserving NFPs in the region as there is not a bottomless pot of money and as a community organisation we need to be cognisant of the needs of others.

We don't have a lot of discretionary expenditure, and we have trimmed what we have as much as I think we can.

The key challenge is clearly to generate more revenue from sponsorship, grants and other donations, but this is not an easy challenge as the grants market is tough and sponsors are hard to come by. We are working on a new sponsorship model, but it won't produce immediate results, which is why we are hoping TSC can show some leniency on our rent until we can get a better model in place.

The attached budget is for Ten FM in total. Although Stanthorpe & Tenterfield operate separate accounts as independent associations, I think in the interests of transparency, we need to show the total picture, and with the support of the Stanthorpe committee, we can transfer funds between the two associations.

What we are seeking is some relief on the rent to give us some space to rebuild the revenue, which I'm sure you can understand is hard work when we are dependent on volunteers.

We do understand that TSC also has challenges and responsibilities to ratepayers, and we therefore have to respect that you have to make the best decision in the interest of all stakeholders. However, we have put in a lot of work this year, and both our Stanthorpe & Tenterfield committees are focused on building Ten FM into a strong and resilient resource as a cross-border community station for the good of our region.

Thank you for allowing us to continue this discussion, and we look forward to a positive outcome."

Financial Statements were provided with this email and are attached as Annexures to this report.

COUNCIL IMPLICATIONS:

1. Community Engagement / Communication (per engagement strategy)

The main reason why Council is pursuing this matter with TenFM is because of its Fiscal Repair Strategy, which includes for Council to question the ongoing viability of the properties it owns. As part of the last Special Rate Variation (SRV) application to IPART, community consultation had been done – highlighting Council's financial situation and its plans to become financial sustainable into the future.

2. Policy and Regulation

- Local Government Act 1993
- Local Government (General) Regulation 2021

3. Financial (Annual Budget & LTFP)

The current rental amount is \$250.00 per week. TenFM has regularly been paying a monthly amount of \$1,184.61 to Council. Erring on the side of caution, the annual rental income represents a minimum amount of \$13,000.

The depreciation cost associated with this building (and shed) is \$9,393 per annum.

4. Asset Management (AMS)

The house structure needs maintenance, the exact amount of which is uncertain. As a rule of thumb, to keep an asset in a well-maintained condition, at least the annual depreciation cost should be expended on the property. Because of Council's financial position, this has not happened on an ongoing basis.

5. Workforce (WMS)

Nil.

6. Legal and Risk Management

There is risk involved with Council not properly maintaining its assets, as they will get run-down and dilapidated – costing large sums of money to restore – and affecting the value of the asset when Council would potentially want to sell the asset.

7. Performance Measures

TenFM has not met the performance measure implemented by Council in May 2022; no letter of response has been received by end January 2025. TenFM is now indicating that they want to remain at 142 Manners Street, but is requesting Council to consider decreasing the weekly rental amount – based on their own inadequate financial position.

SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to request Council to re-establish the current Alcohol Free Zones (AFZ) in Tenterfield, Drake and Urbenville.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

- (1) Receives and notes the report "Alcohol Free Zones Tenterfield, Drake and Urbenville".
- (2) Engages in consultation re the re-establishment of the following alcohol free zones, effective from 31 October 2025 to 30 October 2029:

Tenterfield

All public places that are public roads, footpaths or public car parks within the area bounded by the following:

- Naas Street between Pelham Street and East Street
- East Street between Naas Street and Douglas Street
- Douglas Street between East Street and Pelham Street
- Pelham Street between Douglas Street and Naas Street

Drake

Proposed Zones are as follows:

- Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street between Stuart Street and Picarbin Street
- Alison Street (South) from Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street to Drake Community Hall
- Alison Street (North) from Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street to Koreelah Street

Urbenville

Proposed Zones are as follows:

- Stephen Street between Boomi Street and Tooloom Street.
- Beaury Street between Boomi Street and Tooloom Street.
- Boomi Street between Beaury Street and Stephen Street.
- Welch Street between Beaury Street and Stephen Street.
- Urben Street between Deane Street and Lindsay Street.
- Tooloom Street between Beaury Street and Lindsay Street.; and further
- (3) Subject to no objections, the Alcohol Free Zones as detailed in the report be re-established by Council.

BACKGROUND

The current AFZs in Tenterfield, Drake and Urbenville expire on 30 October 2025.

In accordance with Section 644B of the Local Government Act 1993 (the Act), AFZ can only be for a maximum period of four (4) years. Under Section 644B (4) "An alcohol-free zone may be **re-established** from time to time, in accordance with this Part, for further periods each not exceeding 4 years".

AFZs only apply to the following:

- a. a public road or part of a public road, or
- b. a public place that is a car park or part of a car park."

The current zones are as follows:

Tenterfield

All public places that are public roads, footpaths or public car parks within the area bounded by the following:

- Naas Street between Pelham Street and East Street
- East Street between Naas Street and Douglas Street
- Douglas Street between East Street and Pelham Street
- Pelham Street between Douglas Street and Naas Street

Drake

All public places that are public roads, footpaths or public car parks within the area bounded by the following:

- Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street between Stuart Street and Picarbin Street
- Alison Street (South) from Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street to Drake Community Hall

• Alison Street (North) from Bruxner Highway / Fairfield Street to Koreelah Street

Urbenville

All public places that are public roads, footpaths or public car parks within the area bounded by the following:

- Stephen Street between Boomi Street and Tooloom Street.
- Beaury Street between Boomi Street and Tooloom Street.
- Boomi Street between Beaury Street and Stephen Street.
- Welch Street between Beaury Street and Stephen Street.
- Urben Street between Deane Street and Lindsay Street.
- Tooloom Street between Beaury Street and Lindsay Street.

REPORT:

Tenterfield

Council has liaised with the local Sergeant who has no objections to having the same alcohol free zones in the Tenterfield area. They are still needed and Police want them in place for another term.

Drake and Urbenville

Casino Police has requested that the Alcohol Free Zones remain in place in its current form and also that the existence of Alcohol Free Zones provides an invaluable tool for Police in ensuring the quiet and good order of small communities.

Similarly they have recommended that the Urbenville Alcohol Free Zones remain in the current form. The Alcohol Free Zones are working well and again they assist in maintaining the quiet and good order of the local community.

In order to re-establish the AFZs by 30 October 2025, it is necessary for Council to adopt a resolution to that effect.

COUNCIL IMPLICATIONS:

1. Community Engagement / Communication (per engagement strategy)

Council is required under the *Local Government Act 1993*, Section 644A to prepare a proposal and publish in a newspaper circulating in the area as a whole or in a part of the area that includes the zone concerned. Council is to also invite representations and objections from persons and groups within the area, indicating that any representations or objections by them be made within fourteen (14) days after the date on which the notice is published.

Council must give a copy of its proposal to each of the following persons indicating that any representations or objections by them must be made within 30 days after the date on which the copy is given:

• The officer in charge of the police station within or nearest to the proposed "alcohol – free zone; and

• Each holder of a license in force under the Liquor Act 2007 for premises that border on, or adjoin or are adjacent to, the proposed alcohol-free zone.

2. Policy and Regulation

• The Zones will be in force for four (4) years from 31 October 2025.

3. Financial (Annual Budget & LTFP)

Any costs associated with new or replacement signage will be funded from existing budget allocations.

4. Asset Management (AMS)

Nil.

5. Workforce (WMS)

Nil.

6. Legal and Risk Management

Without re-establishing these signs Police and Council's Enforcement Officers will not be able to enforce the law in relation to drinking in a public place.

7. Performance Measures

The current AFZs have been working well and will assist the Police in dealing with alcohol consumption in key public roads, footpaths and car parks.

Council's Enforcement Officer along with the Police are in support of reestablishing the AFZ's in our Shire as the Police can dispose of any alcohol that they find in the area the signs also discourage the community from drinking in the prescribed areas. The AFZ's are a great deterrent to stop people from consuming alcohol on the street after the pubs have closed; reducing anti-social behaviour and malicious damage in the CBD.

- 2. These requests are to be clearly marked "Works/Service Request", with a brief outline of the identified problem area, the exact location, and a succinct description of the background if and where applicable.

3. Works/Service Requests that are not submitted to the above-mentioned Council email address, or not clearly marked "Works/Service Request" may not be appropriately dealt with in accordance with this procedure due to potential misinterpretation and/or scarce resources. Works/Services Requests are requests submitted by Councillors for staff's further attention, over and above the operational and works program that Council has already approved as part of the annual Operational Plan and Budget.

- 5. Therefore, Works/Service Requests are to not to be viewed as requests that should take priority over other scheduled works and operations that have already been planned for execution as part of effective and efficient management practices.
- 6. Rather, all Works/Service requests will be objectively assessed by the relevant Manager and/or Director and be appropriately scheduled for attention in a costeffective manner – considering budgetary provisions and constraints. It may be the situation that insufficient funds are available to satisfactory address a particular problem, in which case the problem will have to be referred to the following financial year for budgetary considerations.
- 7. Unsafe or emergency situations will receive priority attentionAdministrative staff will properly capture all Works/Service Requests in Council's official records management system and allocate items to the appropriate staff member for the necessary attention.
- 8. A monthly report with all Works/Service Requests will in future be presented to Council as part of the Council Meeting Business Papers for progress monitoring.

 - All RVs allowed on the site (i.e. 44 Francis Street, Tenterfield)
 will be self-contained with their own water and toilet facilities,
 as well as catering for their own gray-water catchment.
 - c. It is possible for the Department of Housing, Planning and Infrastructure to provide the necessary exemption for amenities for this type of development, as has happened within other local government areas such as Gunnedah.
 - d. The proposed development will positively contribute to the Tenterfield Shire's visitor economy – augmenting the accommodation options available within Tenterfield and contributing to the local government area's micro-economy through the multiplying effect of every external dollar being spent in the area to be turned over a few times before it leaves the area again.
- Applies to the Department of Housing, Planning and Infrastructure for the necessary exemption for amenities, and that, based on the response received from this Department, a supplementary report be brought back to Council for its further consideration.

ADMINISTRATION CONDITIONS

1. Approved Development – "Self-contained moveable dwellings"

Development consent has been issued for the "Use of site only for "Self-Contained Moveable Dwellings - 25 sites".

No approval if given for the use of the site by caravans or for camping.

Note: A self-contained moveable dwelling means a moveable dwelling that contains shower and toilet facilities. All self-contained moveable dwellings must be fitted with mechanisms for on board storage of all waste from internal facilities - toilets, showers, sinks and laundries. No grey water is to be disposed of directly on to the ground.

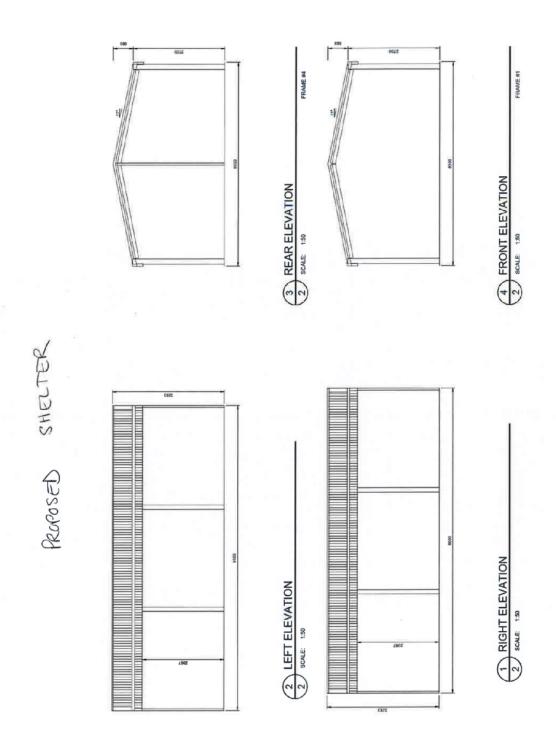

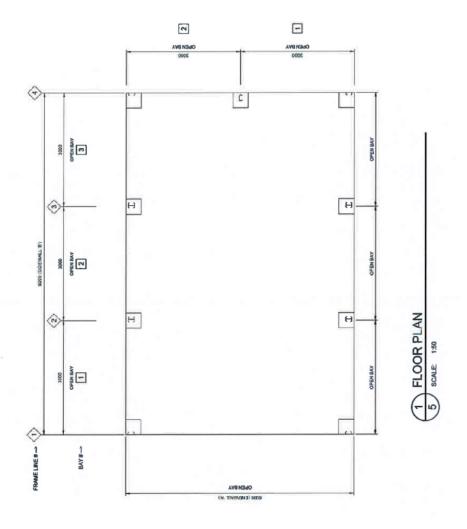

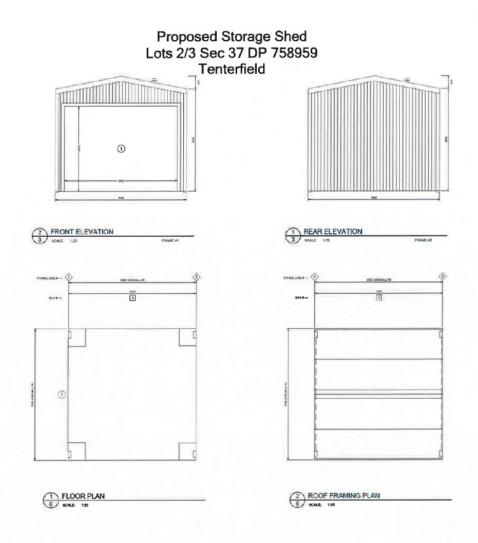

This year a total of seven (7) applications were received for maintenance and conservation works across the Shire which have been reviewed by staff and Council's Heritage Advisor.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

BACKGROUND

Each year, the Office of Environment & Heritage contributes money towards the maintenance and conservation of heritage within the Tenterfield Shire. supplements this amount and a total of \$12,923.00 is available for works for the 2025/26 financial year.

Applications are presented for consideration by the Heritage Advisor. The attachment identifies the applications made, works proposed and recommendations for funding.

Offers of funding will be forwarded to applicants upon Council's resolution. 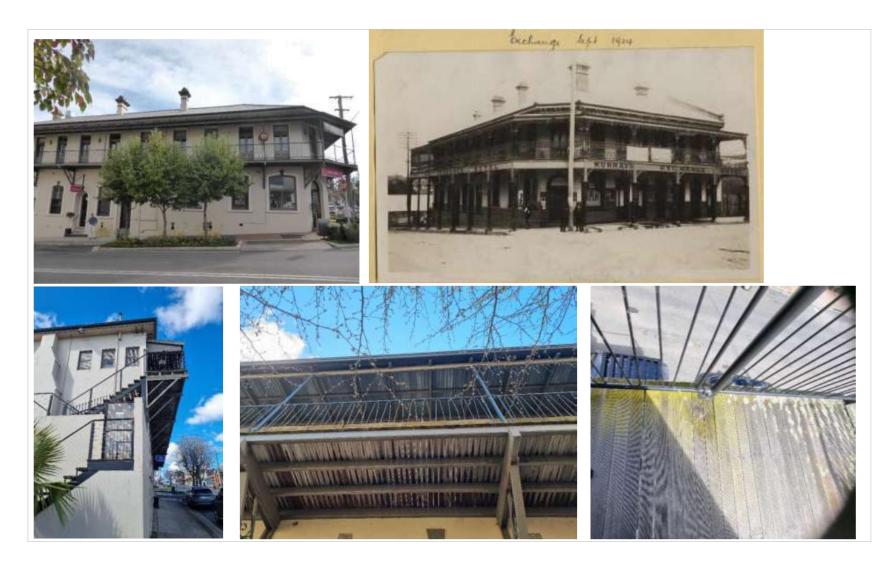

Movement of clay foundation occurs with upand-down variation due to saturation after rainfall and during drought.

This is a chronic problem with repairs being improperly executed over the years using cement, instead of lime, mortar.

Restoration inside has included repair of cracks in walls and plaster ceilings, all of which will reappear in time.

Rapid expansion resin technologies now allow the ground to be stabilised to prevent further movement. This work is best carried out in saturated clay after continuous rain when the resin can better penetrate and the footings are suspended up higher.

Left unattended, each cycle of movement accelerates the extent of cracking.

Stabilising the cracking will create the confidence to permit future rectification of improper repairs, including re-pointing with lime mortar.

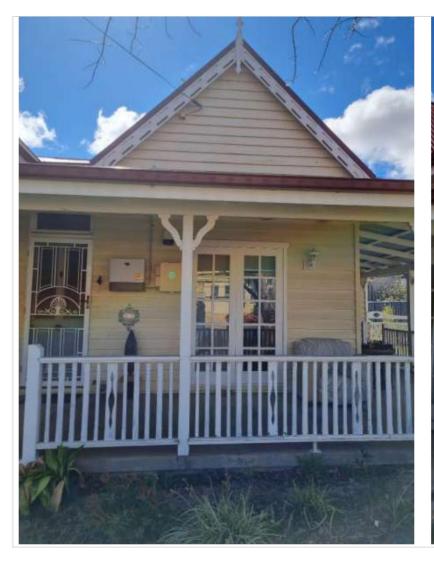

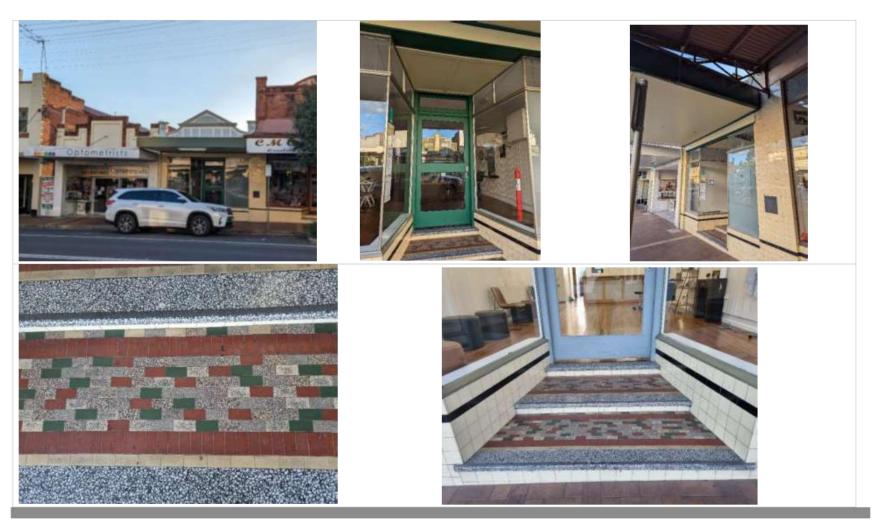

POLICY SCOPE

A pecuniary interest is an interest in a matter because of a reasonable likelihood or expectation of appreciable financial gain or loss to you or a person referred to in Clause 4.3 of the Code of Conduct.

There is no pecuniary interest in a matter if the interest is so remote or insignificant that it could not reasonably be regarded as likely to influence any decision made in relation to the matter, or if the interest is of a kind specified in Clause 4.6 of the Code of Conduct.

A Councillor or designated person must make and lodge with the General Manager, a Disclosures by Councillors and Designated Persons Return within three (3) months after:

- · Becoming a Councillor or designated person,
- 30 June of each year, and
- The Councillor or designated person becoming aware of an interest they are required to disclose which has not previously been disclosed.

POLICY STATEMENT

A pecuniary interest and other matters to be disclosed in the Disclosures by Councillors and Designated Persons Return are prescribed by Schedule 1 of the Model Code of Conduct for Local Councils in NSW (the Model Code of Conduct).

GENERAL MANAGER

- The General Manager must keep a register of returns disclosing interests that are required to be lodged with the General Manager under the Tenterfield Code of Conduct.
- Returns required to be lodged with the General Manager must be tabled at a meeting of the Council, being the first meeting held after the last day specified by the Code of Conduct for lodgement (being 30 June each year).

 - a) Resolves that in its opinion the General Purpose Financial Statements and the Special Purpose Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 and Special Schedules are properly drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Local Government Act 1993, (as amended) and the Regulations there under.
 - b) Approves the Financial Statements for signature by the Mayor, the Deputy Mayor, the General Manager and the Responsible Accounting Officer.
- (2) Refers the Financial Statements to Council's Auditor for audit.
- (3) Forwards the audited Financial Statements to the Office of Local Government by 31 October 2025.
- (4) Delegates to the General Manager the authority to place the Audited Financial Statements on public exhibition from Monday, 3 November 2025 if possible (or the soonest practicable alternative date if not) and that notice be given that Council will present its Audited Financial Statements at the Ordinary Council Meeting to be held on 26 November 2025 if possible (or the soonest practicable alternative date if not).

(5) Requests the audited Financial Statements to be presented at the Ordinary Meeting of Council to be held on 26 November 2025, if possible, in accordance with Section 419(1) of the *Local Government Act 1993*, or alternatively at the soonest practicable date as determined by the General Manager.

BACKGROUND

As per Section 416(1) of the *Local Government Act 1993* (as amended), a Council's Financial Statements for a year must be prepared and audited within four (4) months of the end of the reporting period concerned.

The statutory process that must be followed is that:

- 1. A statement as required under section 413(2) (c) must be made by resolution and signed by the Mayor, one (1) Councillor, the General Manager and the Responsible Accounting Officer.
- 2. The Financial Statements must then be referred to the Council's Auditor, and once audited the statements must be included in Council's Annual Report.
- 3. Copies of the Audited Financial Statements must then be lodged with the Office of Local Government by 31 October 2025.
- 4. As soon as practicable after Council receives a copy of the Auditor's report, the Statements must be placed on public exhibition for a period of seven (7) days and notice given of a meeting at which Council proposes to present its Audited Financial Statements, together with the Auditor's report. This act of giving notice of the meeting is required to be delegated to the General Manager as technically the notice of meeting cannot be set until the final audited Statements and Audit Report are received, however, subject to any matters raised during the audit, the Audited Statements and Audit Reports will be presented at the Council Meeting to be held on 26 November 2025.

It should be noted that Council's Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee was provided with the draft set of Financial Statements prior to the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee meeting held on Wednesday 10 September 2025 and comments received will be incorporated into revisions of these draft financial statements.

REPORT:

A draft of the General Purpose Financial Statements, Special Purpose Financial Statements and Special Schedules for Council for the year ended 30 June 2025 are attached to this report to be referred for audit.

The draft 2024/2025 Financial Statements were presented at the 10 September 2025 Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee meeting where it was resolved:

- (1) That the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee note the report.
- (2) That any comments/suggestions from the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee be incorporated into the final version of the Draft Financial

(3) That the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee recommends to Council that at the 24 September 2025, the draft set of Financial Statements (including any changes identified by the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee and the remaining sections once completed) be referred to Council's Auditors for Audit.

Once the 2024/2025 Financial Statements have been audited, the Auditor's Reports and analysis will be presented to Council and the public at Council's Ordinary Meeting to be held on 26 November 2024, in accordance with Section 419 (1) of the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended).

Overall Result:

A draft of the Annual Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2025 is attached.

The draft Income Statement identifies a Net Operating Result for the 2024/25 year of \$19.685M (\$18.920M in 2023/2024) including capital income.

Council's draft operating result for 2024/25 excluding capital income and capital contributions is showing a deficit of (\$1.302M) compared with a \$6.404M surplus in 2023/2024.

It should be noted that this is a **preliminary result** and is still to be audited. The Audited Financial Statements will be presented to Council in November 2025.

The Annual Financial Statements are prepared on an accrual basis.

Key Factors to which have contributed to the net result during the Financial Year 2024-25 are:

- **Rates Income** The rates peg for 2024/25 was 5.7%, has been added to the rates income levels from the special rates variation 2023/24 (43%). This resulted in a Council rate revenue increase by \$420,000 compared to the prior year.
- Operating Grants Council recognised \$12.075 Million of operating grants in current financial year which is less than in the previous year by \$7 Million. Council received \$4.620 Million of Financial Assistance Grant in the current financial year compared with \$6.098 Million in 2023/24. This is mostly due to less advance payment received in current financial year for the following year allocation (50% compared to 85% in last year). Furthermore, there were less disaster recovery grants recognised in the current financial year because most of them have been received in 2023/24.
- Capital Grants Council recognised \$21 Million of capital grants in the current financial year which is mostly an effect of recognition of income for completion of a series of capital projects, including but not limited to:
 - \$7 Million DRFA AGRN960 EPAR Bruxner Way Bridge 7325 Dumaresq River Overflow Channel
 - o \$3 Million FLR400104 Paddys Flat Road South
 - \$3 Million New Grid Urbenville Water Supply Project
- **Interest Income** Council received approximately \$3.080 Million in Interest Revenue compared to \$1.85M for FY 2023/2024. This was due to the financial

favourable interest rates by the Reserve Bank and Council in receipt of grant monies and additional funds placed in investment instruments.

- **Employee benefits and on-costs** Council increased its employee expense by approximately \$466,000. This was primarily due to lifting the moratorium on recruitment and initiating some recruitment to ease limited resourcing.
- **Material and services** increased by approximately \$4 Million which is mostly due to work on disaster recovery projects.
- **Depreciation Expense** increase in depreciation from \$8.177 Million in FY2024 to \$9.197 Million in the 2025-financial year was mostly due to changes of useful lives for road components as a result of revaluation of roads in 2024 financial year.

- Water and Sewer Fund Results

As per the draft Special Purpose Financial Statements, the Water Fund has made a draft deficit of (\$331K) (\$248K deficit in 2023/2024) before capital income, and the Sewer Fund has made a draft surplus of \$1.084M (\$1.309M in 2023/2024) before capital income.

Certification

Under section 413(2)(c) of the Local Government Act 1993 (as amended), before audit certificates can be issued, it is necessary for Council to adopt a resolution to be attached to the Financial Statements stating that:

Council's Annual Financial Statements and Special Purpose Finance Statements are being prepared in accordance with:

- The Local Government Act 1993, (as amended) and the Regulations made thereunder;
- The Australian Accounting Standards and other pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board;
- The Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

These statements must be signed by the Mayor, one (1) other Councillor, the General Manager and the Responsible Accounting Officer. A copy of the required statement to be signed is included in the attached draft Financial Statements. It has been assumed, similar to past practice, that the Mayor and Deputy Mayor will sign this statement in conjunction with the General Manager and Manager Finance & Technology as the Responsible Accounting Officer.

COUNCIL IMPLICATIONS:

1. Community Engagement / Communication (per engagement strategy)

The Audited Financial Statements form part of Council's Annual Report and therefore represents an integral part of the Integrated Planning and Reporting Framework. The Audited Financial Statements provide an important avenue for the review of Council's progress by any interested stakeholders including the Community and Council is required to exhibit the audited Financial Statements.

It is a requirement that as soon as practicable after receiving a copy of the Auditor's report, that the Statements be placed on public exhibition and notice given of a meeting at which Council proposes to present its Audited Financial

Statements, together with the Auditor's report. As advised above, this should occur at the November Ordinary Council Meeting.

2. Policy and Regulation

There are no Policy issues arising out of this report.

3. Financial (Annual Budget & LTFP)

The Financial Statements are Council's primary form of review on Council's sustainability and the financial performance of Council throughout the reporting For this reason, they remain a crucial part of the performance measurement framework and the financial performance as disclosed should be a serious consideration in any future decision making.

About Council and these financial statements

A1-1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements were authorised for issue by Council on 24 September 2025. Council has the power to amend and reissue these financial statements in cases where critical information is received from public submissions or where the OLG directs Council to amend the financial statements.

The material accounting policy information related to these financial statements are set out below. Accounting policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Australian Accounting Interpretations, the Local Government Act 1993 (Act) and Local Government (General) Regulation 2021 (Regulation), and the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting. Council is a not for-profit entity. The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars and are rounded to the nearest thousand dollars.

Historical cost convention

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment and investment property.

Significant accounting estimates and judgements

The preparation of financial statements requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Council's accounting policies. Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the Council and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

Council makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year include:

- i. fair values of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment refer Note C1-7 ii. tip remediation provisions refer Note C3-5
- iii. employee benefit provisions refer Note C3-4

Significant judgements in applying the Council's accounting policies

- Impairment of receivables refer Note C1-4.
- Determination of whether performance obligations are sufficiently specific and whether the contract is within the scope of AASB 15 Revenue from Contracts with Customers and / or AASB 1058 Income of Not-for-Profit Entities - refer to Notes B2-2 - B2-4
- iii. Determination of the lease term, discount rate (when not implicit in the lease) and whether an arrangement contains a lease - refer to Note C2-1.

Monies and other assets received by Council

The Consolidated Fund

In accordance with the provisions of Section 409(1) of the Local Government Act 1993 (NSW), all money and property received by Council is held in the Council's Consolidated Fund unless it is required to be held in the Council's Trust Fund

The Consolidated Fund has been included in the financial statements of the Council.

Cash and other assets of the following activities have been included as part of the Consolidated Fund:

- General purpose operations
- Tenterfield Water service
- Tenterfield Sewerage service
- Stormwater Management Fund
- Waste Management Fund

Due to their immaterial value and nature, the following committees, entities and operations have been excluded from consolidation:

The Trust Fund

In accordance with the provisions of Section 411 of the *Local Government Act 1993 (NSW)* (as amended), a separate and distinct Trust Fund is maintained to account for all money and property received by the council in trust which must be applied only for the purposes of, or in accordance with, the trusts relating to those monies. Trust monies and property subject to Council's control have been included in these reports.

A separate statement of monies held in the Trust Fund is available for inspection at the council office by any person free of charge

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of associated GST, unless the GST incurred is not recoverable from the taxation authority. In this case it is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of the expense.

Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST receivable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is included with other receivables or payables in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are presented on a gross basis. The GST components of cash flows arising from investing or financing activities that are recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority, are presented as operating cash flows.

Volunteer services

Council does not recognise services provided by volunteers in its income statement due to the immaterialiaty and unjustifiable cost of trying to reliably capture and assign a value to the many services volunteers in our community provide.

New accounting standards and interpretations issued but not yet effective

New accounting standards and interpretations issued but not yet effective

Certain new accounting standards and interpretations have been published that are not mandatory for the 30 June 2025 reporting period. Council has not applied any pronouncements before its operative date in the annual reporting period beginning 1 July 2024.

As at the date of authorisation of these financial statements Council does not consider that any of these new (and still to be applied) standards and interpretations are likely to have a material impact on the Council's future financial statements, financial position, financial performance or cash flows.

New accounting standards adopted during the year

During the year Council adopted all accounting standards and interpretations (as issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board) which were mandatorily effective from the first time at 30 June 2025.

The following new standard is effective for the first time at 30 June 2025.

 AASB 2022-10 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards – Fair Value Measurement of Non-Financial Assets of Not-for-Profit Public Sector Entities.

Based on analysis of existing fair value methodology, the new standard will not have significant impact on the council's reported financial position.

- · AASB 2020-1 Amendments to Australian Accounting Standards Classification of Liabilities as Current or Non-current

Grants and contributions - enforceable agreement with sufficiently specific performance obligations

Grant and contribution revenue from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations is recognised as or when control of each performance obligations is transferred.

The performance obligations may vary according to the agreement. Payment terms vary depending on the terms of the grant, cash is received upfront for some grants and on the achievement of certain payment milestones for others.

Performance obligations may be satisfied either at a point in time or over time and this is reflected in the revenue recognition pattern. Point in time recognition occurs when the beneficiary obtains control of the goods / services at a single time (e.g. completion of the project when a report / outcome is provided), whereas over time recognition is where the control of the services is ongoing throughout the project (e.g. provision of community health services through the year).

Where control is transferred over time, generally the input methods being either costs or time incurred are deemed to be the most appropriate methods to reflect the transfer of benefit.

Capital grants

Capital grants received by Council under an enforceable contract for the acquisition or construction of infrastructure, property, plant and equipment to identified specifications which will be under Council's control on completion are recognised as revenue as and when the obligation to construct or purchase is completed.

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B2-4 Grants and contributions (continued)

For construction projects, this is generally as the construction progresses in accordance with costs incurred since this is deemed to be the most appropriate measure of the completeness of the construction project.

For acquisitions of assets, the revenue is recognised when the asset is acquired and controlled by the Council.

Developer contributions

Council has obligations to provide facilities from contribution revenues levied on developers under the provisions of sections 7.4, 7.11 and 7.12 of the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* (EP&A Act).

While Council generally incorporates these amounts as part of a Development Consents Order, such developer contributions are only recognised as income upon receipt by Council, due to the possibility that individual development consents may not be acted upon by the applicant and, accordingly, would not be payable to Council.

Developer contributions may only be expended for the purposes for which the contributions were required, but Council may apply contributions according to the priorities established in work schedules for the contribution plan.

Other grants and contributions

Assets, including cash, received from other grants and contributions are recognised at fair value when the asset is received. Council considers whether there are any related liability or equity items associated with the asset which are recognised in accordance with the relevant accounting standard.

Once the assets and liabilities have been recognised then income is recognised for any remaining asset value at the time that the asset is received.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation and amortisation are calculated using the straight line method to allocate their cost, net of their residual values, over their estimated useful lives. Useful lives are included in Note C1-7 for IPPE assets and Note C1-7 for intangible assets.

Depreciation is capitalised where in-house assets have contributed to new assets.

Impairment of non-financial assets

Council assets held at fair value that are not held primarily for their ability to generate net cash flow, and that are deemed to be specialised, are not tested for impairment since these assets are assessed on an annual basis to ensure that the carrying amount is not materially different from fair value and therefore an impairment loss would be captured during this assessment.

Intangible assets not yet available for use, are tested annually for impairment, or more frequently if events or changes in circumstances indicate that they might be impaired.

Other non-financial assets that do not meet the criteria above are tested for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use.

For the purposes of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash inflows that are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets (cash-generating units).

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B5 Performance against budget

B5-1 Material budget variations

Council's original budget was adopted by the Council on 26 June 2024 and is not required to be audited. The original projections on which the budget was based have been affected by a number of factors. These include state and federal government decisions, including new grant programs, changing economic activity, environmental factors, and by decisions made by Council

While these General Purpose Financial Statements include the original budget adopted by Council, the Act requires Council to review its financial budget on a quarterly basis, so it is able to manage the variation between actuals and budget that invariably occur during the year.

Material variations of more than 10% between original budget and actual results or where the variance is considered material by nature are explained below.

Variation Key: F = Favourable budget variation, U = Unfavourable budget variation.

C1-4 Receivables (continued)

Material accounting policy information

Receivables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. Receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

Impairment

Impairment of financial assets measured at amortised cost is recognised on an expected credit loss (ECL) basis.

When determining whether the credit risk of a financial asset has increased significantly since initial recognition, and when estimating ECL, the Council considers reasonable and supportable information that is relevant and available without undue cost or effort. This includes both quantitative and qualitative information and analysis based on Council's historical experience and informed credit assessment, and including forward-looking information.

When considering the ECL for rates debtors, Council takes into account that unpaid rates represent a charge against the rateable property that will be recovered when the property is next sold. For non-rates debtors, Council uses the presumption that an asset which is more than 60 days past due has seen a significant increase in credit risk.

The Council uses the presentation that a financial asset is in default when:

- the other party is unlikely to pay its credit obligations to the Council in full, without recourse by the Council to actions such as realising security (if any is held) or
- · the financial assets (for non-rates debtors) are more than 90 days past due.

Credit losses are measured as the present value of the difference between the cash flows due to the entity in accordance with the contract, and the cash flows expected to be received. This is applied using a probability weighted approach.

Council uses the simplified approach for trade receivables where the expected lifetime credit losses are recognised on day 1.

There has been no change in the estimation techniques or significant assumptions made during the current reporting period.

The Council writes off a trade receivable when there is information indicating that the debtor is in severe financial difficulty and there is no realistic prospect of recovery, e.g. when the debtor has been placed under liquidation or has entered into bankruptcy proceedings.

Rates and annual charges outstanding are secured against the property.

Independent comprehensive valuations are performed at least every five years, however the carrying amount of assets is assessed by Council at each reporting date to confirm that it is not materially different from current fair value.

Water and sewerage network assets are indexed at each reporting period in accordance with the Rates Reference Manual issued by Department of Industry (DoI) – Water.

When infrastructure, property, plant and equipment are acquired by Council for nil or consideration significantly less than fair value, the assets are initially recognised at their fair value at acquisition date.

Land is not depreciated unless it was acquired to be controlled by the council for a specified period of time. Depreciation on other assets is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate their carrying amount, net of their residual values, over their estimated remaining useful lives as follows:

Land under roads

Land under roads is land under roadways and road reserves including land under footpaths, nature strips and median strips.

Council has elected not to recognise land under roads acquired before 1 July 2008. Land under roads acquired after 1 July 2008 is recognised in accordance with the IPPE accounting policy.

Crown reserves

Crown reserves under Council's care and control are recognised as assets of the Council. While ownership of the reserves remains with the Crown, Council retains operational control of the reserves and is responsible for their maintenance and use in accordance with the specific purposes to which the reserves are dedicated.

Improvements on Crown reserves are also recorded as assets, while maintenance costs incurred by Council and revenues relating to the reserves are recognised within Council's Income Statement.

The lease is for 80 years and requires payments of a maximum amount of \$1 per year. The use of the right-to-use asset is restricted by the lessor to specified community services which Council must provide, these services are detailed in the lease. Council does not believe that this lease is material from a statement of financial position or performance perspective.

Nature and purpose of provisions

Asset remediation

Council has a legal/public obligation to make, restore, rehabilitate and reinstate the council tip and quarry.

Material accounting policy information

Provisions are recognised when Council has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past events, it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, and the amount has been reliably estimated.

Where there are a number of similar obligations, the likelihood that an outflow will be required in settlement is determined by considering the class of obligations as a whole. A provision is recognised even if the likelihood of an outflow with respect to any one item included in the same class of obligations may be small.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the present obligation at the reporting date. The discount rate used to determine the present value reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the liability. The increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognised as a borrowing cost.

Asset remediation - tips and quarries

Close-down and restoration costs include the dismantling and demolition of infrastructure, and the removal of residual materials and remediation of disturbed areas. Estimated close-down and restoration costs are provided for in the accounting period when the obligation arising from the related disturbance occurs, whether this occurs during the development or during the operation phase, based on the net present value of estimated future costs. Provisions for close-down and restoration costs do not include any additional obligations which are expected to arise from future disturbance. The cost estimates are calculated annually

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C3-5 Provisions (continued)

during the life of the operation to reflect known developments, e.g. updated cost estimates and revisions to the estimated lives of operations, and are subject to formal review at regular intervals.

The ultimate cost of environmental remediation is uncertain and cost estimates can vary in response to many factors, including changes to the relevant legal requirements, the emergence of new restoration techniques, or experience at other locations. The expected timing of expenditure can also change, for example in response to changes in quarry reserves or production rates. As a result, there could be significant adjustments to the provision for close down and restoration and environmental clean-up, which would affect future financial results.

Other movements in the provisions for close-down and restoration costs, including those resulting from new disturbance, updated cost estimates, changes to the estimated lives of operations, and revisions to discount rates, are capitalised within infrastructure, property, plant and equipment. These costs are then depreciated over the lives of the assets to which they relate.

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D2 Interests in other entities

D2-1 Subsidiaries, joint arrangements and associates not recognised

North West Weight of Loads Committee (NWWLC)

Council joined the North West Weight of Loads Committee (NWWLC) in March 2021. The NWWLC is a joint venture between the Council of the Shire of Moree Plains, the Council of the Shire of Narrabri, the Western Plains Regional Council, the Council of the Shire of Glen Innes Severn, the Council of the Shire of Gunnedah, the Council of the Shire of Tenterfield, the Council of the Shire of Inverell and the Council of the Shire of Warrumbungle.

Council's interest in the group capital is 12.5% whith no control or significant influence over the group's activity. The principal activity of the NWWLC is the checking and enforcement of load weights carried by heavy vehicles on roads within the above named Council boundaries.

Tenterfield Shire Council's member contribution to the NWWLC in 2025 financial year was \$24,634.20 (2024: zero).

For the period ended 30 June 2025 NWWLC's net operating income attributable to Tenterfield Shire Council was zero (2024: \$28,723.75).

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E Risks and accounting uncertainties

E1-1 Risks relating to financial instruments held

Council's overall risk management program focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimise potential adverse effects on the financial performance of Council.

Council's objective is to maximise its return on cash and investments while maintaining an adequate level of liquidity and preserving capital. The finance team manage the cash and investments portfolio with the assistance of independent advisers. Council has an investment policy which complies with s 625 of the Act and the Ministerial Investment Order. The policy is regularly reviewed by Council and a monthly investment report is provided to Council setting out the make-up and performance of the portfolio as required by local government regulations.

NSW Council does not engage in transactions expressed in foreign currencies and is therefore not subject to foreign currency risk.

Financial risk management is carried out by the finance team under policies approved by the Councillors.

The fair value of receivables, loans, investments and inancial liabilities approximates the carrying amount.

The risks associated with the financial instruments held are:

- · interest rate risk the risk that movements in interest rates could affect returns
- · liquidity risk the risk that Council will not be able to pay its debts as and when they fall due
- credit risk the risk that a contracting entity will not complete its obligations under a financial instrument resulting in a financial loss to Council.

Council manages these risks by diversifying its portfolio and only purchasing investments with high credit ratings or capital guarantees. Council also seeks advice from its independent advisers before placing any cash and investments.

(b) Credit risk

Council's receivables for the purposes of credit risk exposure comprise two categories:

- 1) Category 1: rates and annual charges (including interests on outstanding rates); statutory entitlements (GST receivable); government grants and subsidies; accrued grants income; and interest on investments.
- 2) Category 2: user charges and fees; private works; other debtors.

Council manages the credit risk associated with these receivables by monitoring outstanding debt and employing stringent debt recovery procedures. Council also encourages ratepayers to pay their rates by the due date through incentives.

The credit risk for liquid funds and other short-term financial assets is considered negligible, since the counterparties are reputable banks with high quality external credit ratings.

There are no significant concentrations of credit risk, whether through exposure to individual customers, specific industry sectors and/or regions

Council makes suitable provision for doubtful receivables as required and carries out credit checks on most non-rate debtors.

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E1-1 Risks relating to financial instruments held (continued)

There are no material receivables that have been subjected to a re-negotiation of repayment terms.

Credit risk profile

Receivables - Category 1

Rates and annual charges (including interest on overdue rates debtors)

Credit risk on rates and annual charges is minimised by the ability of Council to recover these debts as a secured charge over the land; that is, the land can be sold to recover the debt. Council is also able to charge interest on overdue rates and annual charges at higher than market rates, which further encourages payment.

Government grants, subsidies, GST receivable

Credit risk on this type of debtors is negligible due to allocation of the funds to the council for the whole period of fund agreements, absence of evidence of default of the Australian Government in the past, currently and in the future and timely payments made by the government.

Interest on investments

The credit risk for liquid funds and other short-term financial assets is considered negligible, since the counterparties are reputable banks with high quality external credit ratings.

Contract Assets

This class of assets comprises of accrued income under various government grants. Credit risk on this type of accruals is negligible due to allocation of the funds to the council for the whole period of fund agreements, absence of evidence of default of the Australian Government in the past, currently and in the future and timely payments made by the government.

(c) Liquidity risk

Payables, lease liability and borrowings are both subject to liquidity risk – the risk that insufficient funds may be on hand to meet payment obligations as and when they fall due.

Council manages this risk by monitoring its cash flow requirements and liquidity levels and maintaining an adequate cash buffer.

Payment terms can (in extenuating circumstances) also be extended and overdraft facilities utilised as required.

Borrowings are also subject to interest rate risk – the risk that movements in interest rates could adversely affect funding costs and debt servicing requirements. Council manages this risk through diversification of borrowing types, maturities and interest rate structures. The finance team regularly reviews interest rate movements to determine if it would be advantageous to refinance or renegotiate part or all of the loan portfolio.

The timing of cash flows presented in the table below to settle financial liabilities reflects the earliest contractual settlement dates. The timing of expected outflows is not expected to be materially different from contracted cashflows.

Crown Land

All valuations of Crown Land are based upon the land valuations issued by the Valuer - General. Crown Land was valued as at 30 June 2021 using the 1 July 2019 VG valuation data. There has been no change to the valuation process during the reporting period.

Community Land

All valuations of Community Land are based upon the land valuations issued by the Valuer - General. Community Land was valued at as 30 June 2021. There has been no change to the valuation process during the reporting period.

Operational Land

The valuation of Operational Land has been based upon relevant sales in the area. In certain locations there was a lack of appropriate comparable sales evidence and in these instances the closest comparable sales and factors relating the land parcels geographic, land use and zoning where also taken into consideration. The last valuation was undertaken at 30 June 2023 by APV Valuers & Asset Management. There has been no change to the valuation process during the reporting period.

Other Structures, Swimming Pools and Open Space & Recreation Assets

The valuation process involved current replacement cost approach. Unobservable inputs such as replacement cost, asset condition and useful life required extensive professional judgement. The unobservable inputs place this class of asset at Level 3. The last valuation was undertaken on 30 June 2021 by APV Valuers and Asset Management Pty Ltd. There has been no change to the valuation process during the reporting period.

Plant & Equipment, Office Equipment, Furniture & Fittings and Library Books

Plant & Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Library Books and Office Equipment are valued at cost but disclosed at fair value in the Notes of the financial statements. It is assumed that the carrying amount of these asset classes is approximate fair value. Assets include graders, motor vehicles, mowers, chainsaws, computers, tables, chairs, lighting, library books and resources. The key unobservable input is the condition of the assets. There has been no change to the valuation process during the reporting period.

Buildings

Buildings assets are valued externally. Council engaged APV Valuers & Asset Management to perform a comprehensive valuation of buildings assets as at 30 June 2023.

Most of the Council's buildings are specialised by nature and were valued utilising the cost approach. The approach estimated the replacement cost of each building and componentising of significant parts of specific buildings with different useful lives and taking into account a range of factors. Where the unit rates could be supported by market evidence, Level 2 inputs were utilised. Other inputs (such as estimates useful life, asset condition and componentisation) required extensive professional judgement and impacted significantly on the final determination of fair value. As such, these assets have been valued utilising Level 3 inputs.

There were no changes in valuation technique from prior year.

Water supply and Sewerage network assets

Due to specialised nature of the assets all water and sewer network assets were valued using cost approach with the Level 3 input dominating the valuation. As a result, this class of assets is always valued externally with sufficient regularity to ensure carrying amount of the assets is not materially different to fair value. Council engaged independent professional valuer, Australis Asset Advisory Group, to perform a comprehensive revaluation of its water and sewerage supply network assets as at 30 June 2022.

Valuer applied significant judgement in determining following inputs into the valuation process: unit rates, condition assessment and obsolescence, useful life. The valuation technique has not changed from previous year.

Transportation assets

Transportation assets is a valuation class of asset for the purposes of AASB 13 Fair Value Measurement which combines following classes of assets from Note C1-7: roads, bridges, footpaths, bulk earthworks, stormwater drainage.

E2-1 Fair value measurement (continued)

This valuation relies on key unobservable inputs such as unit rates, condition ratings, useful life. The key unobservable inputs and no active market place these assets categories at Level 3. The last valuation was undertaken on 30 June 2024 by AVR Consulting.

Remediation Assets for Tips and Quarries

Restoration, cell capping, leachate collection and site closures have been recognised as significant costs for the remediation assets. In particular, the closing of a landfill site will include preparation, final cell capping, site re-vegetation and leachate management. The key unobservable inputs are discount rate, estimated costs, legislative requirements, and timing of remediation and indexation of labour costs. Council engaged an external independent valuation firm (Australis) to update critical estimates related to rehabilitation of a tip and used interal expertise to update critical estimates for remediation of quarries on 30 June 2022.

Fair value measurements using significant unobservable inputs (level 3)

There were no movements between levels of hierarchy during the year. The operational land level of hierarchy was adjusted to Level 2 retrospectively. For schedule of changes in values please refer to Note C1-6.

Highest and best use

All of Council's non-financial assets are considered as being utilised for their highest and best use.

E3-1 Contingencies

The following assets and liabilities do not qualify for recognition in the Statement of Financial Position, but their knowledge and disclosure is considered relevant to the users of Council's financial report.

LIABILITIES NOT RECOGNISED

1. Guarantees

(i) Defined benefit superannuation contribution plans

Council is party to an Industry Defined Benefit Plan under Active Super – Pool B (the Scheme) which is a defined benefit plan that has been deemed to be a 'multi-employer fund' for purposes of AASB119 Employee Benefits for the following reasons:

- Assets are not segregated within the sub-group according to the employees of each sponsoring employer.
- The contribution rates have been the same for all sponsoring employers. That is, contribution rates have not varied for each sponsoring employer according to the experience relating to the employees of that sponsoring employer.
- Benefits for employees of all sponsoring employers are determined according to the same formulae and without regard to the sponsoring employer.
- The same actuarial assumptions are currently used in respect of the employees of each sponsoring employer.

Given the factors above, each sponsoring employer is exposed to the actuarial risks associated with current and former employees of other sponsoring employers, and hence shares in the associated gains and losses (to the extent that they are not borne by members).

Description of the funding arrangements.

Pooled Employers are required to pay standard employer contributions and additional lump sum contributions to the Fund.

The future service employer contributions were determined using the new entrant rate method under which a contribution rate sufficient to fund the total benefits over the working life-time of a typical new entrant is calculated. The current future service employer contribution rates are::

Division B	1.9 times member contributions for non-180 Point Members; Nil for 180 Point Members*
Division C	2.5% salaries
Division D	1.64 times member contributions

* For 180 Point Members, Employers are required to contribute 9.5% from 1 July 2025 of salaries to these members' accumulation accounts in line with current level of SG contributions, which are paid in addition to members' defined benefits..

The past service contribution for each Pooled Employer is a share of the total past service contributions of \$20.0 million per annum for 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2024, apportioned according to each employer's share of the accrued liabilities as at 30 June.

Given the funding position of the Fund as at 30 June 2024, it was recommended to cease these past service contributions effective 1 January 2025.

The adequacy of contributions is assessed at each triennial actuarial investigation and monitored annually between triennials.

Description of the extent to which Council can be liable to the plan for other Council's obligations under the terms and conditions of the multi-employer plan

As stated above, each sponsoring employer (Council) is exposed to the actuarial risks associated with current and former employees of other sponsoring employers and hence shares in the associated gains and losses.

However, there is no relief under the Fund's trust deed for employers to walk away from their defined benefit obligations. Under limited circumstances, an employer may withdraw from the plan when there are no active members, on full payment of outstanding additional contributions. There is no provision for allocation of any surplus which may be present at the date of withdrawal of the Council.

There are no specific provisions under the Fund's trust deed dealing with deficits or surplus on wind-up.

There is no provision for allocation of any surplus which may be present at the date of withdrawal of an employer.

The amount of Council employer contributions to the Scheme and recognised as an expense for the year ending 30 June 2025 was \$31,653.70. The last valuation of the Scheme was performed by fund actuary, Richard Boyfield, FIAA as at 30 June 2024.

Council's expected contribution to the plan for the next annual reporting period is \$8,891.09.

The share of any funding surplus or deficit that can be attributed to Council is 0.17%

Council's share of that deficiency cannot be accurately calculated as the Scheme is a mutual arrangement where assets and liabilities are pooled together for all member councils. For this reason, no liability for the deficiency has been recognised in Council's accounts. Council has a possible obligation that may arise should the Scheme require immediate payment to correct the deficiency.

The key economic long term assumptions used to calculate the present value of accrued benefits are:

Investment return	6.0% per annum
Salary inflation *	3.5% per annum
Increase in CPI	2.5% per annum

The contribution requirements may vary from the current rates if the overall sub-group experience is not in line with the actuarial assumptions in determining the funding program; however, any adjustment to the funding program would be the same for all sponsoring employers in the Pooled Employers group. Please note that the estimated employer reserves financial position above is a preliminary calculation, and once all the relevant information has been received by me as the Fund's Actuary, the final end of year review will be completed by December 2025..

(ii) Statewide Limited

Council is a member of Statewide Mutual, a mutual pool scheme providing liability insurance to local government.

Membership includes the potential to share in either the net assets or liabilities of the fund depending on its past performance. Council's share of the net assets or liabilities reflects Council's contributions to the pool and the result of insurance claims within each of the fund years.

The future realisation and finalisation of claims incurred but not reported to 30 June this year may result in future liabilities or benefits as a result of past events that Council will be required to fund or share in respectively.

(iii) StateCover Limited

Council is a member of StateCover Mutual Limited and holds a partly paid share in the entity.

StateCover is a company providing workers compensation insurance cover to the NSW local government industry and specifically Council.

Council has a contingent liability to contribute further equity in the event of the erosion of the company's capital base as a result of the company's past performance and/or claims experience or as a result of any increased prudential requirements from APRA

These future equity contributions would be required to maintain the company's minimum level of net assets in accordance with its licence requirements.

(iv) Other guarantees

Council has provided no other guarantees other than those listed above.

2. Other liabilities

(i) Third party claims

The Council is involved from time to time in various claims incidental to the ordinary course of business including claims for damages relating to its services.

Council believes that it is appropriately covered for all claims through its insurance coverage and does not expect any material liabilities to eventuate.

(ii) Potential land acquisitions due to planning restrictions imposed by Council

Council has classified a number of privately owned land parcels as local open space or bushland.

As a result, where notified in writing by the various owners, Council will be required to purchase these land parcels.

At reporting date, reliable estimates as to the value of any potential liability (and subsequent land asset) from such potential acquisitions has not been possible.

ASSETS NOT RECOGNISED

(i) Land under roads

As permitted under AASB 1051, Council has elected not to bring to account land under roads that it owned or controlled up to and including 30/6/08.

(ii) Infringement notices/fines

Fines and penalty income, the result of Council issuing infringement notices is followed up and collected by the Infringement Processing Bureau.

Council's revenue recognition policy for such income is to account for it as revenue on receipt.

Accordingly, at year end, there is a potential asset due to Council representing issued but unpaid infringement notices.

Due to the limited information available on the status, value and duration of outstanding notices, Council is unable to determine the value of outstanding income.

- These Special Purpose Financial Statements have been prepared for the use by both Council and the Office of Local Government in fulfilling their requirements under National Competition Policy.
- ii. The principle of competitive neutrality is based on the concept of a 'level playing field' between persons/entities competing in a market place, particularly between private and public sector competitors.
 - Essentially, the principle is that government businesses, whether Commonwealth, state or local, should operate without net competitive advantages over other businesses as a result of their public ownership.
- iii. For Council, the principle of competitive neutrality and public reporting applies only to declared business activities.
 - These include (a) those activities classified by the Australian Bureau of Statistics as business activities being water supply, sewerage services, abattoirs, gas production and reticulation, and (b) those activities with a turnover of more than \$2 million that Council has formally declared as a business activity (defined as Category 1 activities).
- iv. In preparing these financial statements for Council's self-classified Category 1 businesses and ABS-defined activities, councils must (a) adopt a corporatisation model and (b) apply full cost attribution including tax-equivalent regime payments and debt guarantee fees (where the business benefits from Council's borrowing position by comparison with commercial rates).

Note – Material accounting policy information

A statement summarising the supplemental accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the special purpose financial statements (SPFS) for National Competition Policy (NCP) reporting purposes follows.

These financial statements are SPFS prepared for use by Council and the Office of Local Government. For the purposes of these statements, the Council is a non-reporting not-for-profit entity.

The figures presented in these special purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement criteria of relevant Australian Accounting Standards, other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and Australian Accounting Interpretations.

The disclosures in these special purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the *Local Government Act* 1993 (Act), the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021* (Regulation) and the Local Government Code of Accounting Practice and Financial Reporting.

The statements are prepared on an accruals basis. They are based on historic costs and do not take into account changing money values or, except where specifically stated, fair value of non-current assets. Certain taxes and other costs, appropriately described, have been imputed for the purposes of the National Competition Policy.

The Statement of Financial Position includes notional assets/liabilities receivable from/payable to Council's general fund. These balances reflect a notional intra-entity funding arrangement with the declared business activities.

National Competition Policy

Council has adopted the principle of 'competitive neutrality' in its business activities as part of the National Competition Policy which is being applied throughout Australia at all levels of government. The framework for its application is set out in the June 1996 NSW Government Policy statement titled 'Application of National Competition Policy to Local Government'. *The Pricing and Costing for Council Businesses – A Guide to Competitive Neutrality* issued by the Office of Local Government in July 1997 has also been adopted.

The pricing and costing guidelines outline the process for identifying and allocating costs to activities and provide a standard for disclosure requirements. These disclosures are reflected in Council's pricing and/or financial reporting systems and include taxation equivalents, Council subsidies, and returns on investments (rate of return and dividends paid).

Declared business activities

In accordance with Pricing and Costing for Council Businesses – A Guide to Competitive Neutrality, Council has declared that the following are to be considered as business activities:

Category 1

(where gross operating turnover is over \$2 million)

a. Tenterfield Shire Water Supplies

Water supply system servicing the towns of Tenterfield, Urbenville and Jennings.

b. Tenterfield Shire Sewerage Services

Sewerage reticulation and treatment system servicing the towns of Tenterfield and Jennings

Category 2

(where gross operating turnover is less than \$2 million)

Ni

Taxation equivalent charges

Council is liable to pay various taxes and financial duties. Where this is the case, they are disclosed as a cost of operations just like all other costs. However, where Council does not pay some taxes, which are generally paid by private sector businesses, such as income tax, these equivalent tax payments have been applied to all Council-nominated business activities and are reflected in special purpose finanncial statements. For the purposes of disclosing comparative information relevant to the private sector equivalent, the following taxation equivalents have been applied to all Council-nominated business activities (this does not include Council's non-business activities):

<u>Land tax</u> – the first \$1,075,000 of combined land values attracts **0**%. For the combined land values in excess of \$1,075,000 up to \$6,571,000 the rate is **\$100 + 1.6**%. For the remaining combined land value that exceeds \$6,571,000 a premium marginal rate of **2.0**% applies.

Payroll tax - 5.45% on the value of taxable salaries and wages in excess of \$1,200,000.

In accordance with DCCEEW's regulatory and assurance framework, a payment for the amount calculated as the annual tax equivalent charges (excluding income tax) must be paid from water supply and sewerage business activities.

The payment of taxation equivalent charges, referred to in the regulatory and assurance framework as a 'dividend for taxation equivalent', may be applied for any purpose allowed under the Act.

Achievement of substantial compliance to DCCEEW's regulatory and assurance framework is not a prerequisite for the payment of the tax equivalent charges; however the payment must not exceed \$3 per assessment.

Income tax

An income tax equivalent has been applied on the profits of the business activities. Whilst income tax is not a specific cost for the purpose of pricing a good or service, it needs to be taken into account in terms of assessing the rate of return required on capital invested. Accordingly, the return on capital invested is set at a pre-tax level – gain/(loss) from ordinary activities before capital amounts, as would be applied by a private sector competitor. That is, it should include a provision equivalent to the relevant corporate income tax rate, currently 25% (LY 25%).

Income tax is only applied where a gain from ordinary activities before capital amounts has been achieved. Since the taxation equivalent is notional – that is, it is payable to the 'Council' as the owner of business operations – it represents an internal payment and has no effect on the operations of the Council.

Accordingly, there is no need for disclosure of internal charges in the SPFS. The rate applied of 25% is the equivalent company tax rate prevalent at reporting date.

Local government rates and charges

A calculation of the equivalent rates and charges for all Category 1 businesses has been applied to all assets owned, or exclusively used by the business activity.

Loan and debt guarantee fees

The debt guarantee fee is designed to ensure that Council business activities face 'true' commercial borrowing costs in line with private sector competitors. In order to calculate a debt guarantee fee, Council has determined what the differential borrowing rate would have been between the commercial rate and Council's borrowing rate for its business activities.

(i) Subsidies

Government policy requires that subsidies provided to customers, and the funding of those subsidies, must be explicitly disclosed. Subsidies occur where Council provides services on a less than cost recovery basis. This option is exercised on a range of services in order for Council to meet its community service obligations. The overall effect of subsidies is contained within the Income Statements of business activities.

(ii) Return on investments (rate of return)

The NCP policy statement requires that councils with Category 1 businesses 'would be expected to generate a return on capital funds employed that is comparable to rates of return for private businesses operating in a similar field'.

Funds are subsequently available for meeting commitments or financing future investment strategies. The rate of return is disclosed for each of Council's business activities on the Income Statement.

(iii) Dividends

Council is not required to pay dividends to either itself as owner of a range of businesses, or to any external entities.

A local government water supply and sewerage business is permitted to pay annual dividends from their water supply or sewerage business surpluses. Each dividend must be calculated and approved in accordance with DCCEEW's regulatory and assurance framework and must not exceed 50% of the relevant surplus in any one year, or the number of water supply or sewerage assessments at 30 June 2025 multiplied by \$30 (less the payment for tax equivalent charges, not exceeding \$3 per assessment).

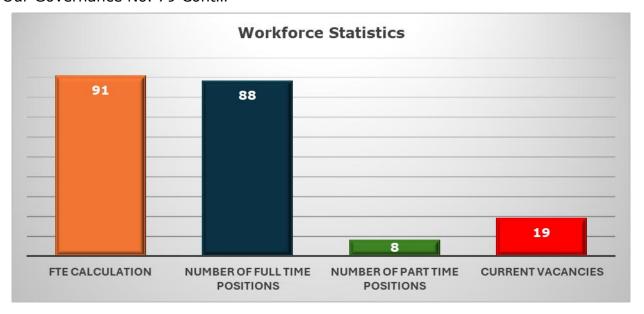

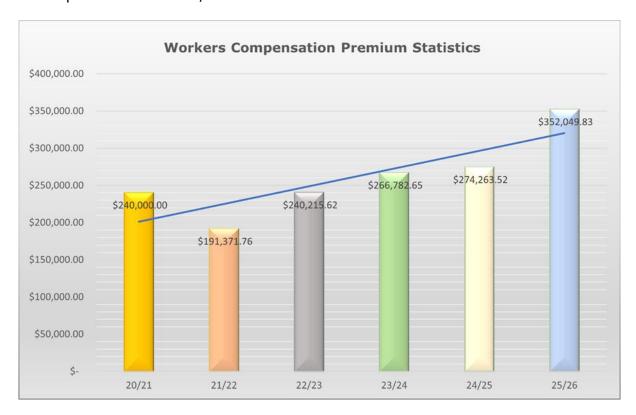

Annual Workers Compensation Premium Statistics

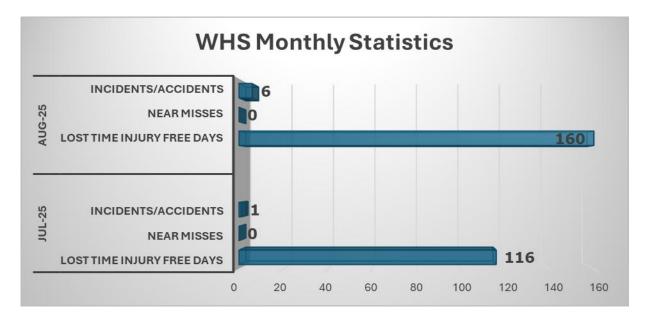

Whilst the formal principles framework and process as required by AS 3100 is now in place, this only represents the beginning of the ongoing journey to fully integrate the concept of risk management or risk informed decisions into all of our decision making, be it strategic, operational, or project based. Ongoing work is required by all internal stakeholders including Councillors, Senior Management and other employees of Council to make maximum utilisation of the benefits and opportunities using risk management concepts. Consequently, it is recommended a conscious effort is made by all parties to incorporate wherever possible, a discussion of risk and how it can effect and better inform when making decisions.

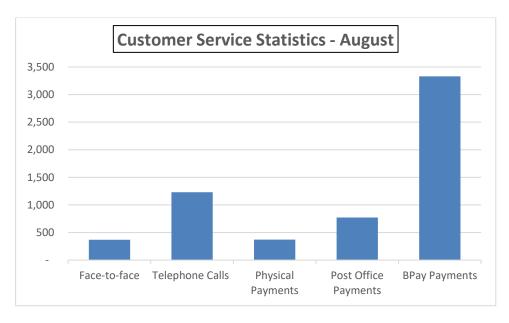

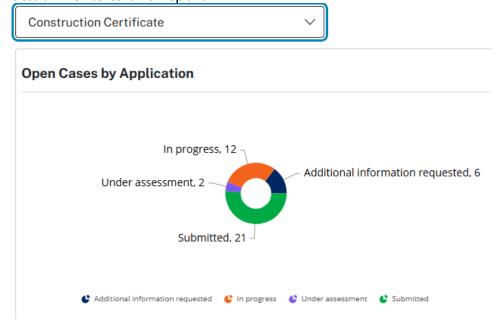

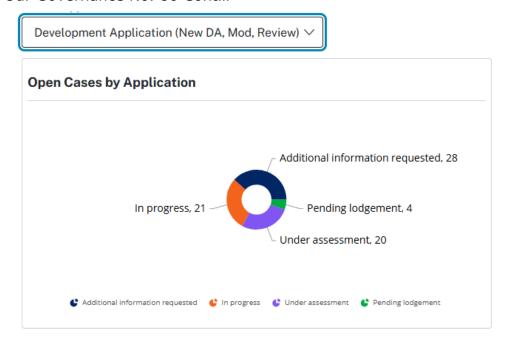

- Repairs are continuing to be being carried out on Council properties to ensure maintenance schedules of Council buildings are kept up to date.
- Request for quote for an accessible toilet to be constructed at the Youth Precinct has now been received and is overbudget, awaiting quotes for Market Square before committing to a quote.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

Appoints Ms. Liz Jeremy as an independent and voting member of the Tenterfield Shire Council's Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee.

BACKGROUND

The Local Government Act 1993 and Local Government (General) Regulation 2021 require each Council in NSW to have an Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee (ARIC) that continuously reviews and provides independent advice to the Council on how it is functioning and managing risk.

Council, at its Ordinary Meeting held on 23 June 2025, adopted the following resolution:

Resolved

That Council:

- Notes the report to Council on the current standing of the Expression of Interest (EOI) process for an Independent Committee Member to join Council's Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee (ARIC).
- Endorses the inclusion of the current Councillor representative of ARIC, Cr Peter Murphy, to act as the Councillor representative on the selection panel.

Motion Carried

REPORT:

An expression of interest (EOI) for this vacancy was established in early May and distributed throughout the suitably qualified Internal Audit Network of approximately 190 members and closed on May 31, 2025. Council has received eight (8) high caliber responses to this EOI.

Interviews with five (5) applicants were held on Wednesday, 3 September 2025. The interview panel consisted of Cr Murphy as Council's nominee onto ARIC, the General Manager and the Governance Officer – filling in for the Director Corporate Services who was unwell.

Two of the candidates were assessed by the panel as being of an exceptional standard, i.e. Ms. Liz Jeremy and Mr. Ron Gillard. The opinion is held that Council would be privileged to have any of these two candidates on its ARIC because of their breath of experience, wealth of knowledge and pragmatic approaches to challenges.

It was decided by the panel to recommend to Council for Ms. Liz Jeremy to be appointed to the vacancy of independent member with voting rights. Cr Murphy at the conclusion of the interviews mentioned his intention to bring a Notice of Motion to this Council Meeting for Mr. Gillard to also be appointed as an independent member of ARIC; which Notice of Motion forms a part of the order of business for this meeting.
