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INTRODUCTION FROM OUR MAYOR

Mayor Bronwyn Petrie

continue to focus on the delivery of services in a financially responsible and sustainable manner as we seek to ensure Council's future financial sustainability. This plan is where we work to turn the community's vision into on-the-ground actions that will be delivered during this term of Council, and more specifically what will be delivered during the 2025-26 financial year.

This Delivery Program and the associated Operational Plans will

It is a critical component of Council's obligation to the community and has been developed by taking into account what you, the community, told us were your priorities, and in consideration of Council's financial situation. Additionally we continue to advocate on behalf of the community for increased funding, reduction in government cost-shifting, and to support safety, law and order, health, equitable disaster funding, liveability, tourism and business economic sustainability.

Although the Council financial situation remains challenging we have been fortunate to have achieved some significant improvements that reduce the impact on ratepayers, and Councillors were able to defer any application for a further Special Rate Variation for the 2024-26 financial years, as well as reducing the \$5 million overdraft facility to \$2.67 million.

The Tripartite Agreement we secured with the State and Federal governments mid-2024 has been one of the biggest positives *ever* for this Shire. Council now receives funding in stages for approved disaster repair works instead of having to pay upfront and await reimbursement, dramatically improving the cash flow. Investment of some grant funds on short term deposits has increased income, as has the increase in Roads to Recovery Funding. Staff reductions have also contributed to an improved financial position, however the reductions in some areas are showing a reduced level of service and increased staff pressure.

After considerable delays in assessments and approvals, Council has received the go-ahead for most of our road infrastructure disaster claims from March 2021 to May 2022. Delays in the approvals have been frustrating to both Council and the community, however we can now move forward with certainty. A third of the bridges and the whole bitumen road network have also undergone technical assessment. Many grant projects have been completed or are near completion including the Urbenville Water Augmentation, Drake Village infrastructure revitalisation, village bores, Tenterfield saleyard and sporting facilities and the Boonoo Boonoo land fill additional cell. Additional non-disaster grant works are underway.

There is always considerable work to do by Council and within the community, but we have dedicated staff, committed Councillors, and a community that has been relatively supportive and patient as we have grappled with multiple disasters and financial pressures. Together we can work towards the goal of maintaining and improving our Shire for the good of our residents and visitors, and ensure a financially sustainable Tenterfield Shire Council for the future.

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GENERAL MANAGER'S MESSAGE

The Tenterfield Shire Council (TSC), like many other local authorites in NSW and indeed nationwide, finds itself in an unfortunate financial position.

The NSW State Government's policy of rate pegging over a sustained period of 48 years (since 1977), the Commonwealth Government's refusal to increase Financial Assistance Grants (FAGs) to its initial 1% of all federal revenues (currently sitting at 0.51%), continued cost shifting from the other spheres of

Government onto the Local Government Sector (calculated to be \$1.9million for the 2024/25 Financial Year alone for TSC), constant rises in the cost of commodities like materials, plant, equipment, and labour - with increases above the consumer price index (CPI) especially within the construction industry (roads, bridges, culverts, causeways) - make it impossible for the local government sector to sustainably survive. Focusing only on the aspect of rate pegging, the compounding effect of property rate rises at percentages markedly lower than the CPI for a period of 45 years, has had a devastating effect on this sector.

Therefore, TSC is not alone in this financial dilemma.

The following is a short extract of the NSW Auditor General's most recent report regarding the financial sustainability of councils:

At 30 June 2024, 35 councils (10 metropolitan, 10 regional and 15 rural) met just one or none of the three key financial sustainability benchmarks. Fifty-two councils (40%) did not meet the operating performance benchmark and 59 councils (46%) did not meet the infrustructure renewal benchmark. Two councils - Bathurst Regional and Shoalhaven City - have not met any of the benchmarks for at least three years. In addition, the cash and investments of these two councils (not subject to external restrictions) were insufficient to meet three months of their expenses [within their General Funds only] (excluding depreciation and borrowing costs). This indicates more serious risks to their continued financial sustainability. A further 14 councils did not have cash and investments (not subject to external restrictions) to meet three months of their expenses (excluding depreciation and borrowing costs).

The above extract paints a stark picture of the industry, especially if one considers that 85% of the FAGs has been received in the previous financial year; skewing the financial year-end results of Councils significantly and making Councils appear more financially sustainable than what they really are.

TSC has over the last number of years pro-actively tried to address its financial decline - which has unfortunately resulted in significant ramifications and collateral damage for this Council. The policy of a blanket moratorium on the filling of positions that have become vacant, reducing staffing numbers from 112 full time equivalent positions to 82 over a period of approximately three years, has decimated the organisation's access to corporate knowledge and capacity to deliver services in an effective and efficient manner. At the time of writing this commentary, TSC also had 14 vacant positions - compounded by difficulties in the sector to attract and retain competent staff, Tenterfield's perceived remote location, comparatively high real estate prices and lack of rental properties.

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Employees are, generally speaking, over-burdened and overwhelmed with trying to meet compliance requirements, expending large amounts of grant funding (including disaster relief funding) carried forward from previous financial years, and trying to deal with what is perceived to be relentless, unrealistic service expectations - resulting in a demoralized workforce with low morale.

As a result, I have considerable concerns about the organisation's ability and capacity to adhere to Work Health and Safety requirements and considerations, and the psychosocial risk this Council is now exposed to.

This Delivery Program (DP) for the next four years, including the Operational Plan (OP) and Budget for the 2025/26 financial year, is an honest attempt to start addressing these above-mentioned issues, whilst also consolidating these efforts with valid community expectations and aspirations contained in the Community Strategic Plan.

The DP and OP (and Budget), amongst many other things, address the following:

- Identification of nine key positons that are necessary to start building the capacity of the organisation again;
- Identification of 12 trainee positions, making use of the State Government's initiative to fund these trainee positions;
- Questioning the existing fees and charges associated with the water, sewer and waste funds with either no increases or decreases recommended for these service areas for the next financial year:
- Bringing into the equation robust asset management data pertaining to Council's sealed and unsealed road network, 52 bridges and properties - which information is crucial in determining TSC's true infrastructure backlog and financial position;
- Adjusting Council's rating model to achieve a higher level of equity across the different rating categories, e.g. better aligning the Rural Residential rating category (formerly called Residential Other) with the other Residential and Farmland categories - planned to be phased in over a twoyear period;
- Flagging the need for council to pursue a Special Rate Variation to ideally increase funding
 availability for its local roads network and remove its ongoing operational budget deficits as
 shown in the Long Term Financial Plan in future years, however, for the timing of this exercise to
 be properly thought-through.

I extend my thanks and appreciation to the other members of the Leadership Executive Team, all other staff who are working hard and doing their best under taxing circumstances, and to the Mayor and Councillors for working together to produce this fresh start.

Council has an onging commitment to work with the different members and groups of our community to continually shape, represent and support our shared vision for the Tenterfield Shire Council underpinned by our continued collaboration. The legislation requires Council and its communities to engage in discussions about funding priorities and acceptable service levels, taking into consideration local conditions and opportunities to plan for a sustainable future.

To achieve sustainability as a community, our Community Strategic plan needs to be based on the quadruple bottom line (QBL) considerations. The QBL considers the pillars of environmental, social, economic and government leadership in the quest for a holistic, sustainable and viable community. The QBL approach supports the Community Strategic Plan to ensure a balanced outlook and importantly ensures no one particular aspect dominates.

The key documents required under the legislation are:

The **Community Strategic Plan (CSP)** - identifies long term (minimum 10 years) goals and priorities for the community and local government area. The CSP outlines the strategies and measures to achieve the goals

The **Delivery Program (DP)** - identifies what Council is responsible for delivering to support the Community Strategic Plan. The DP allows Council to set priorities for its elected term.

The **Operational Plan (OP)** - details the programs, projects and activities Council will undertake during the financial year to implement the Delivery Program.

These plans are underpinned by a resourcing strategy which is made up of:

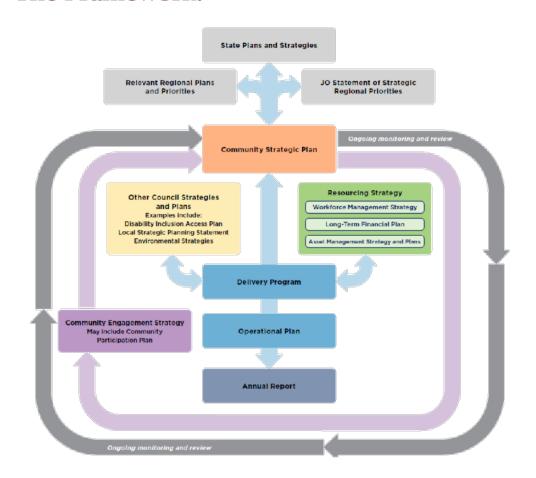
- · Council's Long-Term Financial Plan (LTFP),

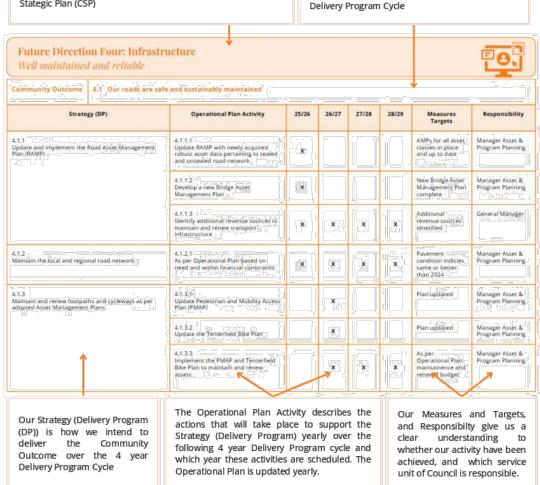

SUMMARY

The Quarterly Report shows the progress of each of the operational activities that Council is undertaking in the 2025/2026 financial year. This report is for the July, August and September quarter 2025. This report has been amended to reflect the Organisational Structure reported at this Council Meeting.

OFFICER'S RECOMMENDATION:

That Council:

Receives and notes the Quarterly Report on the progress of the Delivery Program and Operational Activities.

BACKGROUND

The Integrated Planning and Reporting (IP&R) framework recognises that most communities share similar aspirations: a safe, healthy and vibrant place to live, a sustainable environment, a caring and engaged community, opportunities for employment and reliable infrastructure. The difference lies in how each community responds to these needs. That is what shapes the character of individual cities, towns and villages. IP&R also recognises that council plans and policies should not exist in isolation and are connected on many levels.

REPORT:

Under section 404 of the *Local Government Act 1993* the Delivery Program is Council's commitment to the community about what it will deliver during its term in office to achieve the Community Strategic Plan objectives. The Operational Plan shows the individual projects and activities a Council will undertake in a specific year.

The General Manager must ensure that progress reports are provided to the Council, with respect to the principal activities detailed in the Delivery Program, at least every six (6) months. Tenterfield Shire Council Delivery Program, as adopted, has set out

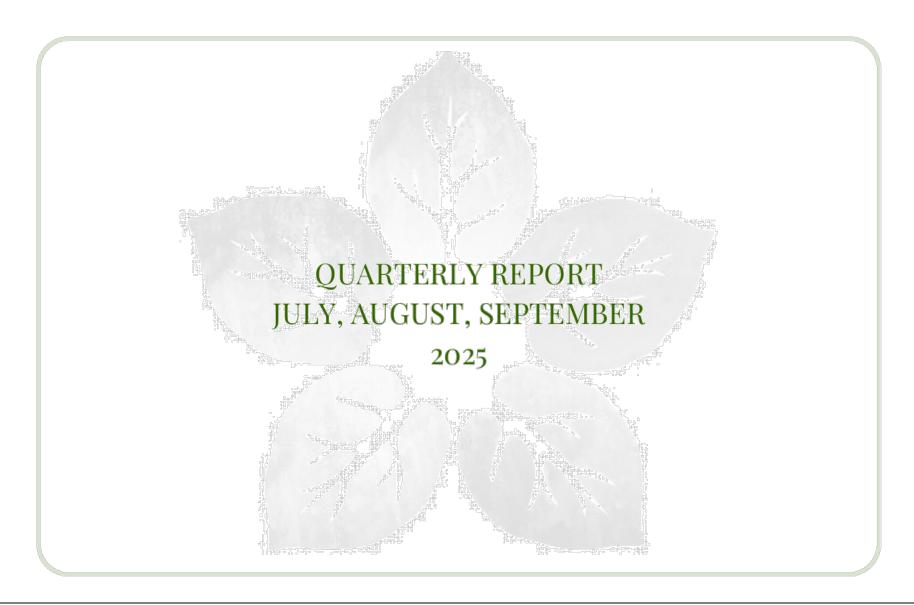

Black Knapweed - Fortnightly inspections of the core infestation on Aldershot and Bellevue roads were completed. Monthly inspections on the other 5 historical sites were completed. No plants were found outside of the core infestation and Bellevue road.

Tropical Soda Apple - 7 properties were inspected in the Tabulam area.

High Risk Pathways-The New England Highway, Bruxner Highway, Bruxner Way had no new incursions. 7 Black Knapweed plants were found along Bellevue Road last visit, no plants found on Aldershot Road.

High Risk Waterways- the Clarence River and Timbarra River were inspected where accessible. No new incursions were found.

Spraying activities- Lantana and Mother of Millions were treated along the Mt Lindsey Highway and Tooloom Road. Annual Ragweed and Pattersons Curse were treated on Rivertree Road.

Council lands sprayed were the new and old water treatment plants, sewage plant and ponds, Tenterfield Sale Yards, Tenterfield Transfer Station and Pound, Bruxner Park, Tenterfield Swimming Pool and privet removal from the Tenterfield Creek from Douglas St to the Showgrounds on the Eastern side of the creek. Works on the western side is yet to commence.

- 2. These requests are to be clearly marked "Works/Service Request", with a brief outline of the identified problem area, the exact location, and a succinct description of the background if and where applicable.
- 3. Works/Service Requests that are not submitted to the above-mentioned Council email address, or not clearly marked "Works/Service Request" may not be

appropriately dealt with in accordance with this procedure due to potential misinterpretation and/or scarce resources.

- 4. Works/Services Requests are requests submitted by Councillors for staff's further attention, over and above the operational and works program that Council has already approved as part of the annual Operational Plan and Budget.
- Therefore, Works/Service Requests are not to be viewed as requests that should take priority over other scheduled works and operations that have already been planned for execution as part of effective and efficient management practices.
- 6. Rather, all Works/Service requests will be objectively assessed by the relevant Manager and/or Director and be appropriately scheduled for attention in a costeffective manner – considering budgetary provisions and constraints. It may be the situation that insufficient funds are available to satisfactory address a particular problem, in which case the problem will have to be referred to the following financial year for budgetary considerations. Unsafe or emergency situations will receive priority attention.
- 7. Administrative staff will properly capture all Works/Service Requests in Council's official records management system and allocate items to the appropriate staff member for the necessary attention.
- 8. A monthly report with all Works/Service Requests will in future be presented to Council as part of the Council Meeting Business Papers for progress monitoring.

REPORT:

Although the information presented in this report may not be complete and current, it is envisaged that this report will be further honed and refined into the future.

Amend the "Councillor and Staff Interaction Policy" to:

- a) Reinstate Councillor ability to directly contact Managers and vice versa.
- b) Provide for the Mayor to attend the post Council meeting briefings of Depot and Administration staff.

Background:

We are a team, Councillors until 2024 were able to directly contact Managers and vice versa. This ability was removed with staff contact limited to the General Manager, Director of Infrastructure, Director of Corporate Services and the Executive Assistant.

Following this there has been increased pressure on the General Manager and Directors to act as concierges for often uncomplicated issues instead of being able to concentrate on their higher level responsibilities, and Councillors are frequently reminded of how busy they are.

Additionally, there have been several occurrences of misinterpreted contact from Councillors acting in other roles in the community.

It is common in many other Councils that Councillors can contact Managers as per previous practice in Tenterfield.

It is also common in many other Councils for the Mayor, when available, to attend the staff debriefings post Council meetings. This was also previous practice in Tenterfield. We are a team and we should not be fostering division.

The above motion and background have been received in hard copy format on Monday, 13 October 2025 – signed by the Mayor as mover and Councillor Greg Purcell as seconder.

Commentary: General Manager

Council's Code of Meeting Practice states the following regarding notices of motions:

Giving notice of business to be considered at council meetings

Notice of Motion No. 8 Cont...

3.9 A councillor may give notice of any business they wish to be considered by the council at its next ordinary meeting by way of a notice of motion. To be included on the agenda of the meeting, the notice of motion must be in writing and must be submitted by 5pm on the Monday of the week preceding the week of the Council Meeting, being seven (7) business days before the meeting is to be held.

- 3.10 A councillor may, in writing to the general manager, request the withdrawal of a notice of motion submitted by them prior to its inclusion in the agenda and business paper for the meeting at which it is to be considered.
- 3.11 If the general manager considers that a notice of motion submitted by a councillor for consideration at an ordinary meeting of the council has legal, strategic, financial or policy implications which should be taken into consideration by the meeting, the general manager may prepare a report in relation to the notice of motion for inclusion with the business papers for the meeting at which the notice of motion is to be considered by the council.
- 3.12A notice of motion for the expenditure of funds on works and/or services other than those already provided for in the council's current adopted operational plan must identify the source of funding for the expenditure that is the subject of the notice of motion. If the notice of motion does not identify a funding source, the general manager must either:
 - (a) prepare a report on the availability of funds for implementing the motion if adopted for inclusion in the business papers for the meeting at which the notice of motion is to be considered by the council, or
 - (b) by written notice sent to all councillors with the business papers for the meeting for which the notice of motion has been submitted, defer consideration of the matter by the council to such a date specified in the notice, pending the preparation of such a report.

The following comments are made regarding the part (a) and part (b) of the notice of motion respectively:

Legal implications:

- (a) Section 335 of the *Local Government Act 1993* deals with the functions of the general manager (GM). These functions are as follow:
 - (a) to conduct the day-to-day management of the council in accordance with the strategic plans, programs, strategies and policies of the council,
 - (b) to implement, without undue delay, lawful decisions of the council,
 - (c) to advise the mayor and the governing body on the development and implementation of the strategic plans, programs, strategies and policies of the council,
 - (d) to advise the mayor and the governing body on the appropriate form of community consultation on the strategic plans, programs, strategies and policies of the council and other matters related to the council,
 - (e) to prepare, in consultation with the mayor and the governing body, the council's community strategic plan, community engagement strategy, resourcing strategy, delivery program, operational plan and annual report,

(f) to ensure that the mayor and other councillors are given timely information and advice and the administrative and professional support necessary to effectively discharge their functions,

- (g) to exercise any of the functions of the council that are delegated by the council to the general manager,
- (h) to appoint staff in accordance with the organisation structure determined under this Chapter and the resources approved by the council,
- (i) to direct and dismiss staff,
- (j) to implement the council's workforce management strategy,
- (k) any other functions that are conferred or imposed on the general manager by or under this or any other Act.

Meetings with staff have been changed from being purely "post-council meeting briefings" to staff meetings where an array of relevant administration and staffing matters are being discussed – including Council Meetings.

Even in those instances where staff are instructed on decisions made by council and directing them on their implementation at these meetings, "these are operational matters, and it is difficult to see any circumstances where it would be necessary or appropriate for the mayor to attend meetings with staff of this nature." (Advice obtained from the Office of Local Government (OLG) on 14 October 2025.)

Strategic implications:

- (a) and (b) Section 232 of the *Local Government Act 1993* deals with the role of a Councillor, as follows:
- (a) to be an active and contributing member of the governing body,
- (b) to make considered and well informed decisions as a member of the governing body,
- (c) to participate in the development of the integrated planning and reporting framework,
- (d) to represent the collective interests of residents, ratepayers and the local community,
- (e) to facilitate communication between the local community and the governing body,
- (f) to uphold and represent accurately the policies and decisions of the governing body,
- (g) to make all reasonable efforts to acquire and maintain the skills necessary to perform the role of a councillor.

The elected representatives form the governing body. The staff members within the organisation form the administration. The governing body has a strategic focus, with the administration having an operational focus.

(a) The Model "Councillors and Staff Interaction Policy" as developed by the Office of Local Government (OLG) has previously been adopted by Council, and has again been adopted on 23 October 2024 after the general local government elections.

A copy of the above-mentioned Policy is annexed to this Notice of Motion as Attachment 1, for the ease of reference of Councillors.

This Policy should be read in its totally, and particular individual provisions should not be read in isolation. Such an approach will lead to misinterpretation of the Policy.

The advice obtained on 14 October 2025 from the OLG in this regard reads as follows:

"OLG has no view on what level of staff councillors should have access to. Ultimately it is a matter for the council and general manager to agree on what level of staff councillors may have access to and to ensure this is reflected in the councillor and staff interaction policy."

Following this there has been increased pressure on the General Manager and Directors to act as concierges for often uncomplicated issues instead of being able to concentrate on their higher level responsibilities, and Councillors are frequently reminded of how busy they are.

Additionally there have been several occurrences of misinterpreted contact from Councillors acting in other roles in the community.

It is common in many other Councils that Councillors can contact Managers as per previous practice in Tenterfield.

It is also common in many other Councils for the Mayor, when available, to attend the staff debriefings post Council meetings. This was also previous practice in Tenterfield. We are a team and we should not be fostering division.

Summary:

The purpose of this policy is to outline the legislative requirements as well as Councils position and procedures with regard to Councillors access to information and the interaction between Councillors and staff.

It further aims to ensure that the differing roles of Councillors, the General Manager and Staff are understood and respected and that any inappropriate interactions are avoided.

Part 1 - Introduction

- 1.1.1 The Councillor and Staff Interaction Policy (the Policy) provides a framework for councillors when exercising their civic functions by specifically addressing their ability to interact with, and receive advice from, authorised staff.
- 1.1.2 The Policy complements and should be read in conjunction with Tenterfield Shire Council's *Code of Conduct* (the Code of Conduct).
- 1.1.3 The aim of the Policy is to facilitate a positive working relationship between councillors, as the community's elected representatives, and staff, who are employed to administer the operations of the Council. The Policy provides direction on interactions between councillors and staff to assist both parties in carrying out their day-to-day duties professionally, ethically and respectfully.
- 1.1.4 It is important to have an effective working relationship that recognises the important but differing contribution both parties bring to their complementary roles.

Part 2 - Application

- 2.1.1 This Policy applies to all councillors and council staff.
- 2.1.2 This Policy applies to all interactions between councillors and staff, whether face-to-face, online (including social media and virtual meeting platforms), by phone, text message or in writing.
- 2.1.3 This Policy applies whenever interactions between councillors and staff occur, including inside or outside of work hours, and at both council and non-council venues and events.
- 2.1.4 This Policy does not confer any delegated authority upon any person. All delegations to staff are made by the General Manager.
- 2.1.5 The Code of Conduct provides that council officials must not conduct themselves in a manner that is contrary to the Council's policies. A breach of this Policy will be a breach of the Code of Conduct.

Part 3 - Policy objectives

- 3.1.1 The objectives of the Policy are to:
 - establish positive, effective and professional working relationships between councillors and staff defined by mutual respect and courtesy
 - b) enable councillors and staff to work together appropriately and effectively to support each other in their respective roles
 - c) ensure that councillors receive advice in an orderly, courteous and appropriate manner to assist them in the performance of their civic duties
 - d) ensure councillors have adequate access to information to exercise their statutory roles
 - e) provide direction on, and guide councillor interactions with, staff for both obtaining information and in general situations
 - f) maintain transparent decision making and good governance arrangements
 - g) ensure the reputation of Council is enhanced by councillors and staff interacting consistently, professionally and positively in their day-to-day duties
 - h) provide a clear and consistent framework through which breaches of the Policy will be managed in accordance with the Code of Conduct.

Part 4 – Principles, roles and responsibilities

- 4 Several factors contribute to a good relationship between councillors and staff. These include goodwill, understanding of roles, communication, protocols, and a good understanding of legislative requirements.
- 4.1 The Council's governing body and its administration (being staff within the organisation) must have a clear and sophisticated understanding of their different roles, and the fact that these operate within a hierarchy. The administration is accountable to the General Manager, who in turn, is accountable to the Council's governing body.
- 4.2 Section 232 of the *Local Government Act 1993* (the LGA) states that the role of a councillor is as follows:
 - a) to be an active and contributing member of the governing body
 - to make considered and well-informed decisions as a member of the governing body

- to participate in the development of the integrated planning and reporting framework
- d) to represent the collective interests of residents, ratepayers and the local community
- e) to facilitate communication between the local community and the governing body
- f) to uphold and represent accurately the policies and decisions of the governing body
- g) to make all reasonable efforts to acquire and maintain the skills necessary to perform the role of a councillor.
- 4.3 The administration's role is to advise the governing body, implement Council's decisions and to oversee service delivery.
- 4.4 It is beneficial if the administration recognises the complex political environments in which elected members operate and acknowledge that they work within a system that is based on democratic governance. Councillors similarly need to understand that it is a highly complex task to prepare information and provide quality advice on the very wide range of issues that Council operations cover.
- 4.5 Council commits to the following principles to guide interactions between councillors and staff:

<u>Principle</u>	Achieved by
Equitable and consistent	Ensuring appropriate, consistent and equitable access to information for all councillors within established service levels
Considerate and respectful	Councillors and staff working supportively together in the interests of the whole community, based on mutual respect and consideration of their respective positions
Ethical, open and transparent	Ensuring that interactions between councillors and staff are ethical, open, transparent, honest and display the highest standards of professional conduct
Fit for purpose	Ensuring that the provision of equipment and information to councillors is done in a way that is suitable, practical and of an appropriate size, scale and cost for a client group of ten people
Accountable and measurable	Providing support to councillors in the performance of their role in a way that can be measured, reviewed and improved based on qualitative and quantitative data

4.6 Councillors are members of the Council's governing body, which is responsible for directing and controlling the affairs of the Council in accordance with the LGA. Councillors need to accept that:

- a) responses to requests for information from councillors may take time and consultation to prepare and be approved prior to responding
- b) staff are not accountable to them individually
- they must not direct staff except by giving appropriate direction to the General Manager by way of a council or committee resolution, or by the mayor exercising their functions under section 226 of the LGA
- d) they must not, in any public or private forum, direct or influence, or attempt to direct or influence, a member of staff in the exercise of their functions
- e) they must not contact a member of staff on council-related business unless in accordance with this Policy
- f) they must not use their position to attempt to receive favourable treatment for themselves or others.
- 4.7 The General Manager is responsible for the efficient and effective day-to-day operation of the Council and for ensuring that the lawful decisions of the Council are implemented without undue delay. Council staff need to understand:
 - a) they are not accountable to individual councillors and do not take direction from them. They are accountable to the General Manager, who is in turn accountable to the Council's governing body
 - b) they should not provide advice to councillors unless it has been approved by the General Manager or a staff member with a delegation to approve advice to councillors
 - they must carry out reasonable and lawful directions given by any person having the authority to give such directions in an efficient and effective manner
 - d) they must ensure that participation in political activities outside the service of the Council does not interfere with the performance of their official duties
 - e) they must provide full and timely information to councillors sufficient to enable them to exercise their civic functions in accordance with this Policy.

Part 5 - The councillor requests system

5.1 Councillors have a right to request information provided it is relevant to councillor's exercise of their civic functions. This right does not extend to matters about which a councillor is merely curious.

- 5.2 Councillors do not have a right to request information about matters that they are prevented from participating in decision-making on because of a conflict of interest, unless the information is otherwise publicly available.
- 5.3 The General Manager may identify Council support staff (Executive Assistant & Media) under this Policy for the management of requests from councillors.
- 5.4 Councillors can use the councillor requests system to:
 - request information or ask questions that relate to the strategic position, performance or operation of the Council
 - b) bring concerns that have been raised by members of the public to the attention of staff
 - c) request Information and Communications Technology or other support from the Council administration
 - d) request that a staff member be present at a meeting (other than a meeting of the council) for the purpose of providing advice to the meeting.
- 5.5 Councillors must, to the best of their knowledge, be specific about what information they are requesting, and make their requests respectfully. Where a councillor's request lacks specificity, the General Manager or staff member authorised to manage the matter is entitled to ask the councillor to clarify their request and the reason(s) why they are seeking the information.
- 5.6 Staff must make every reasonable effort to assist councillors with their requests and do so in a respectful manner.
- 5.7 The General Manager or the staff member authorised to manage a councillor request will provide a response within (30 working days). Where a response cannot be provided within that timeframe, the councillor will be advised, and the information will be provided as soon as practicable.
- 5.8 Requests under clause 5.4 (d) must be made (7 working days) before the meeting. The General Manager, or members of staff that are listed at Schedule 1 of this Policy, are responsible for determining:
 - a) whether a staff member can attend the meeting; and
 - b) which staff member will attend the meeting.
 - Staff members who attend such meetings must be appropriately senior and be subject matter experts on the issues to be discussed at the meeting.
- 5.9 Councillors are required to treat all information provided by staff appropriately and to observe any confidentiality requirements.
- 5.10 Staff will inform councillors of any confidentiality requirements for information they provide so councillors can handle the information appropriately.

- 5.11 Where a councillor is unsure of confidentiality requirements, they should contact the General Manager, or the staff member authorised to manage their request.
- 5.12 The General Manager may refuse access to information requested by a councillor if:
 - a) the information is not necessary for the performance of the councillor's civic functions, or
 - b) if responding to the request would, in the General Manager's opinion, result in an unreasonable diversion of staff time and resources, or
 - c) the councillor has previously declared a conflict of interest in the matter and removed themselves from decision-making on it, or
 - d) the General Manager is prevented by law from disclosing the information.
- 5.13 Where the General Manager refuses to provide information requested by a councillor, they must act reasonably. The General Manager must advise a councillor in writing of their reasons for refusing access to the information requested.
- 5.14 Where a councillor's request for information is refused by the General Manager on the grounds referred to under clause 5.12 (a) or (b), the councillor may instead request the information through a resolution of the council by way of a notice of motion. This clause does not apply where the General Manager refuses a councillor's request for information under clause 5.12 (c) or (d).
- 5.15 Nothing in clauses 5.12, 5.13, and 5.14 prevents a councillor from requesting the information in accordance with the *Government Information* (Public Access) Act 2009.
- 5.16 Where a councillor persistently makes requests for information which, in the General Manager's opinion, result in a significant and unreasonable diversion of staff time and resources the council may, on the advice of the General Manager, resolve to limit the number of requests the councillor may make.
- 5.17 Councillor requests are state records and must be managed in accordance with the *State Records Act 1998*.
- 5.18 A monthly report will be provided to Council regarding the performance and efficiency of the councillor requests system against established key performance indicators.

Part 6 - Access to Council staff

- 6.1.1 Councillors may directly contact members of staff that are listed in Schedule 1 of this Policy. The General Manager may amend this list at any time and will advise councillors promptly of any changes.
- 6.1.2 Councillors can contact staff listed in Schedule 1 about matters that relate to the staff member's area of responsibility.
- 6.1.3 Councillors should as far as practicable, only contact staff during normal business hours.
- 6.1.4 If councillors would like to contact a member of staff not listed in Schedule 1, they must receive permission from the General Manager.
- 6.1.5 If a councillor is unsure which authorised staff member can help with their enquiry, they can contact the General Manager or Executive Assistant & Media who will provide advice about which authorised staff member to contact.
- 6.1.6 The General Manager or a member of the Council's executive leadership team may direct any staff member to contact councillors to provide specific information or clarification relating to a specific matter.
- 6.1.7 A councillor or member of staff must not take advantage of their official position to improperly influence other councillors or members of staff in the performance of their civic or professional duties for the purposes of securing a private benefit for themselves or for another person. Such conduct should be immediately reported to the General Manager or Mayor in the first instance, or alternatively to the Office of Local Government, NSW Ombudsman, or the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption.

Part 7 - Councillor access to council buildings

- 7.1.1 Councillors are entitled to have access to the council chamber, meeting rooms, and public areas of Council's buildings during normal business hours for meetings. Councillors needing access to these facilities at other times must obtain approval from the General Manager.
- 7.1.2 Councillors must not enter staff-only areas of Council buildings without the approval of the General Manager.

Part 8 – Appropriate and inappropriate interactions

- 8.1.1 Examples of appropriate interactions between councillors and staff include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a) councillors and council staff are courteous and display a positive and professional attitude towards one another
 - council staff ensure that information necessary for councillors to exercise their civic functions is made equally available to all councillors, in accordance with this Policy and any other relevant Council policies
 - c) council staff record the advice they give to councillors in the same way they would if it was provided to members of the public
 - d) council staff, including Council's executive team members, document councillor requests via the councillor requests system
 - e) council meetings and councillor briefings are used to establish positive working relationships and help councillors to gain an understanding of the complex issues related to their civic duties
 - f) councillors and council staff feel supported when seeking and providing clarification about council related business
 - g) councillors forward requests through the councillor requests system and staff respond in accordance with the timeframes stipulated in this Policy
- 8.1.2 Examples of inappropriate interactions between councillors and staff include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a) councillors and council staff conducting themselves in a manner which:
 - i) is contrary to their duties under the Work Health and Safety Act 2011 and their responsibilities under any policies or procedures adopted by the Council to ensure workplace health and safety
 - constitutes harassment and/or bullying within the meaning of the Code of Conduct, or is unlawfully discriminatory
 - b) councillors approaching staff and staff organisations to discuss individual or operational staff matters (other than matters relating to broader workforce policy such as, but not limited to, organisational restructures or outsourcing decisions), grievances, workplace investigations and disciplinary matters
 - c) staff approaching councillors to discuss individual or operational staff matters (other than matters relating to broader workforce policy such as, but not limited to, organisational restructures or outsourcing decisions), grievances, workplace investigations and disciplinary matters
 - d) subject to clause 5.12, staff refusing to give information that is available to other councillors to a particular councillor

- e) councillors who have lodged an application with the council, discussing the matter with staff in staff-only areas of the council
- f) councillors being overbearing or threatening to staff
- g) staff being overbearing or threatening to councillors
- h) councillors making personal attacks on staff or engaging in conduct towards staff that would be contrary to the general conduct provisions in Part 3 of the Code of Conduct in public forums including social media
- i) councillors directing or pressuring staff in the performance of their work, or recommendations they should make
- j) staff providing ad hoc advice to councillors without recording or documenting the interaction as they would if the advice was provided to a member of the community
- 8.1.3 Where a councillor engages in conduct that, in the opinion of the General Manager, puts the health, safety or welfare of staff at risk, the General Manager may restrict the councillor's access to staff.
- 8.1.4 Any concerns relating to the conduct of staff under this Policy should be raised with the General Manager.

Part 9 - Complaints

- 9.1.1 Complaints about a breach of this policy should be made to the General Manager (if the complaint is about a councillor or member of council staff), or the Mayor (if the complaint is about the General Manager).
- 9.1.2 Clause 9.1 does not operate to prevent matters being reported to OLG, the NSW Ombudsman, the NSW Independent Commission Against Corruption or any other external agency.

- 4. If councillors would like to contact a member of staff not listed below, they must receive permission from the General Manager or their delegate.
- If a councillor is unsure which authorised staff member can help with their enquiry, they can contact the General Manager or Executive Assistant & Media who will provide advice about which authorised staff member to contact.
- 6. In some instances, the General Manager or a member of the Council's executive leadership team may direct a council staff member to contact councillors to provide specific information or clarification relating to a specific matter.

- These requests are to be clearly marked "Works/Service Request", with a brief
 outline of the identified problem area, the exact location, and a succinct
 description of the background if and where applicable.
- Works/Service Requests that are not submitted to the above-mentioned Council
 email address, or not clearly marked "Works/Service Request" may not be
 appropriately dealt with in accordance with this procedure due to potential
 misinterpretation and/or scarce resources.
- 4. Works/Services Requests are requests submitted by Councillors for staff's further attention, over and above the operational and works program that Council has already approved as part of the annual Operational Plan and Budget.
- Therefore, Works/Service Requests are to not to be viewed as requests that should take priority over other scheduled works and operations that have already been planned for execution as part of effective and efficient management practices.
- 6. Rather, all Works/Service requests will be objectively assessed by the relevant Manager and/or Director and be appropriately scheduled for attention in a cost-effective manner considering budgetary provisions and constraints. It may be the situation that insufficient funds are available to satisfactory address a particular problem, in which case the problem will have to be referred to the following financial year for budgetary considerations. Unsafe or emergency situations will receive priority attention.
- Administrative staff will properly capture all Works/Service Requests in Council's
 official records management system and allocate items to the appropriate staff
 member for the necessary attention.
- 8. A monthly report with all Works/Service Requests will in future be presented to Council as part of the Council Meeting Business Papers for progress monitoring.

Requests the General Manager to report to Council the process for Council to submit a Development Application on Council owned vacant land for the purpose of sale or development for housing and business purposes.

Background:

Vacant Council land could be sold for development for housing and/or business purposes. Council would receive increased funds if land was sold with pre-existing DA approvals.

The above Notice of Motion and Background have been received in hard copy format on Monday, 13 October 2025 – signed by Councillor Gregory Purcell as mover and Councillor Roger Turner as seconder.

Commentary – General Manager

Council's Code of Meeting Practice states the following regarding notices of motions:

Giving notice of business to be considered at council meetings

- 3.9 A councillor may give notice of any business they wish to be considered by the council at its next ordinary meeting by way of a notice of motion. To be included on the agenda of the meeting, the notice of motion must be in writing and must be submitted by 5pm on the Monday of the week preceding the week of the Council Meeting, being seven (7) business days before the meeting is to be held.
- 3.10 A councillor may, in writing to the general manager, request the withdrawal of a notice of motion submitted by them prior to its inclusion in the agenda and business paper for the meeting at which it is to be considered.
- 3.11 If the general manager considers that a notice of motion submitted by a councillor for consideration at an ordinary meeting of the council has legal, strategic, financial or policy implications which should be taken into consideration by the meeting, the general manager may prepare a report in relation to the notice of motion for inclusion with the business papers for the meeting at which the notice of motion is to be considered by the council.

3.12A notice of motion for the expenditure of funds on works and/or services other than those already provided for in the council's current adopted operational plan must identify the source of funding for the expenditure that is the subject of the notice of motion. If the notice of motion does not identify a funding source, the general manager must either:

- (a) prepare a report on the availability of funds for implementing the motion if adopted for inclusion in the business papers for the meeting at which the notice of motion is to be considered by the council, or
- (b) by written notice sent to all councillors with the business papers for the meeting for which the notice of motion has been submitted, defer consideration of the matter by the council to such a date specified in the notice, pending the preparation of such a report.

No further comments are deemed necessary at this point in time, as a subsequent report will address relevant considerations if the motion gets adopted by Council.

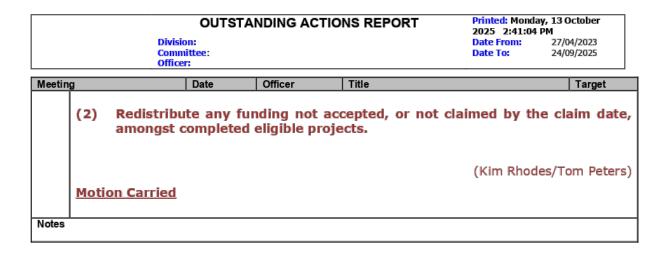
